CORK.

The people of Cork are engaged in a laudable effort to raise another monument to the memory of Father Mathew in the shape of a new public hall.

The visit of His Eminence Cardinal Loras, of Kilkenny, was the occasion of several demonstrations of affection. A number of addresses were presented.

St. Mary's Cathedral, Kilkenny, has been solemnly opened after renovation and completion. The ceremonies were attended by the following prelates and distinguished ecclesiastics:—His Eminence Cardinal Logue, Primate of all Ireland, Most Rev. Dr. Walsh, Archbishop of Dublin, Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Bishop of Clonfert, Most Rev. Dr. Donnelly, Bishop of Canea; the Most Rev. Dr. Lyster, Bishop of Achery, the Most Rev. Dr. McMeoldom, Bishop of Kilkelloe, the Most Rev. Dr. Hoare, Bishop of Ardagh; the Most Rev. Dr. Owens, Bishop of Clogher, the Most Rev. Dr. Foley, Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin; the Most Rev. Dr. Browne, Bishop of Ferns; the Most Rev. Dr. O'Callaghan, Bishop of Cork; the Most Rev. Dr. Sheehan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore; and the Most Rev. the Abbot of Mount Mellreagh. The Mayor and members of the Corporation attended in State, and there was an immense gathering of clergy and laity. Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by the Most Rev. Dr. Donnelly, Bishop of Canea. His Eminence Cardinal Logue presided. After the first Gospel the Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Bishop of Clonfert, ascended the pulpit, and preached a very eloquent sermon, taking for his text, "And I say to thee that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." ENGLAND.

VICAR APOSTOLIC OF GIBRALTAR. Father Bellard has been appointed Vicar Apostolic of Gibraltar. He is an army chaplain of the first class, and, stationed at Colchester, his ministered to the Roman Catholic troops of that garrison for the past three or four years. His parents were members of the Congregation of St. Joseph's, at the top of Highgate-hill. His father was a solicitor practising in the city of London. Both parents died within the last five years, and both attained more than seventy years of age.

ENGLISH BISHOPS AND THE POPE.

The "Tablet" states that at the annual meeting of the Bishops, it was decided to send in the adherence of the English hierarchy to the programme of the International Committee in London, which is organizing a great movement among Catholics of all the world, for the end of the century. The object of the movement, and the means by which it is sought to promote it, are thus described in the official programme:—"To promote among Catholics of the entire world, in the year 1900, at the close of the nineteenth and the opening of the twentieth century, a solemn homage of gratitude and devotion to our Divine Redeemer Jesus Christ, and of love and obedience to His August Vicar, the Roman Pontiff. (1) The uniting of all Catholics in a bond of holy love, so that they may by prayer and good works endeavour to obtain from God the liberty and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church; peace and unity among all Christian peoples, the conversion of sinners, and the special blessing attending the opening of the Holy Year. (2) To collect, with the assistance of the smallest contributions, an offering of Catholic holy love, to be laid at the feet of the august Vicar of Christ, as a tribute of fidelity to the Chair of St. Peter, and as a token of an ardent desire of seeing the great blessings of the Redemption ever more and more extended among the nations of the earth. (3) To promote, in the time preceding 1900, pilgrimages, both in person and in spirit, to the most famous shrines, and in the year 1900 pilgrimages to Rome from every part of the world to gain Holy Indulgences, and to raise a hymn of love and gratitude to our Divine King and Redeemer Jesus Christ at the tomb of his first Vicar (St. Peter), and to testify to the Supreme Pontiff devoted attachment and perfect obedience."

ROYALISTS IN ROME.

The Easter of 1899 has been distinguished for the immense gathering of strangers in Rome. It is said that no less than eighty or ninety thousand tourists and travellers have descended upon Rome within a few weeks. Hotels are filled to overflowing, and people in pensions are put to sleep in sitting-rooms and corridors, and bath-rooms. The Duke and Duchess of Connaught are staying at the Bristol hotel, in the Piazza Barberini; the Duke of Cambridge has rooms in the Grand hotel. The Prince of Wales came here last week for a few hours, and it is said that she would have stayed a day or two but there was no place where she could lodge with that comfort considered necessary for members of a Royal family.

DIED IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The Kimberley Advertiser, of March 20th, announces the death of Mr. James Farrelly, of Beaconsfield. Mr. Farrelly, according to the Advertiser, arrived in Cape Colony in 1838. Subsequently settling down in Beaconsfield, he became one of the best known and most successful fishermen in the place. He was a particular friend of Mr. Moses Cornwall, who represented the Cape Irishmen at the National Convention in the Leinster hall in 1856, and who was three times mayor of Kimberley.
