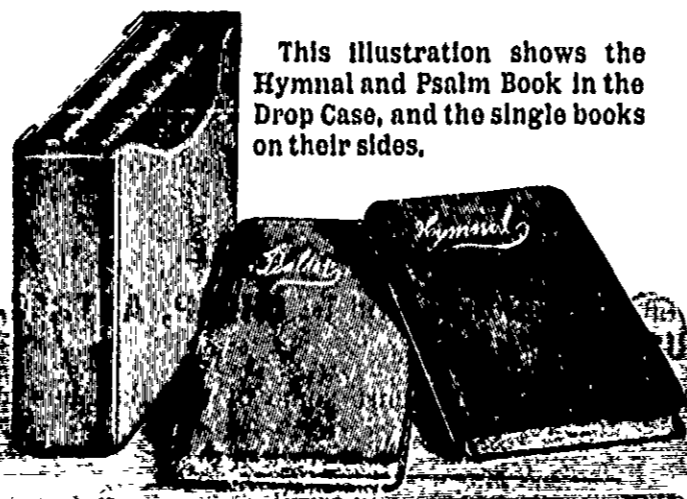

**FOR INFORMATION.**

The above is a sketch of one of the oldest, and (for its simplicity) the most simple counter runs yet devised; it is intended to be made by an artist, and the question is often asked, "How does an artist know about science? Why should he attempt designs or out of place, or out of the way, or inartistic, to invent and improve, or solve the most difficult problems? There is no more critical or more arduous demand for improvement and harmony in all things than the true artist, and so he said and shall say, 'Consistency and harmony, thou art Jewell.'"

While visiting a friend and while walking with him through a field, he was ploughing, that he discovered a new and simple method in the working of his plough, and immediately invented one of the most simple and most effective, which is now working more satisfactorily and at no extra expense. I would not say that it is necessary that there should be a space between the point and coupler of the plough. If so, the point and coupler should be at its proper level. Any space above mentioned is most important. It is shown in the above sketch of an old style plough. In the new style, letter P indicates to what the extent of the space on the coupler, wearing it into a notch, there must be a space or outlet and at this depth from the point. The principal cause of this requires a new method of grain roots. Experts from the States, Canada and the United States and others, all testify that my invention is the only one that was ever invented which provides for this important feature, giving a through cut from bottom to top without combination; either the coupler or coupler may be removed to be obstructed in the same run.
