When the program starts it prompts you for a keyword. If you press the Enter key alone the program will stop. If you enter a keyword, the program prompts you for aother keyword. You can type up to 9 keywords. When you are finished press the Enter key again and the program will start to search the computer file for all company descriptions that contain all of the keywords. The company information will be listed on the screen. You will be allowed to page up and down through descriptions that are too big to fit on one screen. You may wish to print the description on your printer. If you press the Enter key the program will continue through the computer file looking for another company description that contain the keywords that you specify.

Please note that this program treats the keywords entered as a simple string of characters. Blanks are treated as a normal part of your keyword. "vision " and "vision" are different keywords. The later will match within a word like division whereas the former will not.

If you are looking for companies that are involved with graphics you could provide one keyword: graphics. If you are only interested in companies that work with graphics on UNIX systems, you would specify two keywords: graphics and UNIX. If you are interested in companies that are involved with graphics on UNIX or DOS systems, you should make the inquiry as above, and then make a second inquiry, specifying two more keywords: graphics and DOS.

If you wish to browse through all of the companies, simply enter a keyword of one letter that is contained in every company description. The letter a is a good example. Entering a as the only keyword will display every company in the computer file.
