I SHOULD LIKE TO LIMIT MY REMARKS TODAY TO A MAJOR

ELEMENT IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF CANADIAN POLICY TOWARD THE PACIFIC—
OUR IMPORTANT AND INCREASING COMPLEX RELATIONS WITH JAPAN.

WHEN THE TRUDEAU GOVERNMENT TOOK THE DECISION SEVERAL YEARS AGO
TO PLACE HIGH PRIORITY ON DEVELOPING AND EXPANDING CANADA'S

RELATIONS WITH JAPAN IT WAS IN RECOGNITION THAT JAPAN HAD EMERGED
AS A GLOBAL POWER WITH IMPORTANT INTERNATIONAL INTERESTS PRIMARILY,
ALBEIT NOT EXCLUSIVELY, IN THE ECONOMIC SPHERE. IT WAS SEEN THAT,
JAPAN, ONE OF THE WORLD'S LEADING TRADING NATIONS, WOULD PLAY A
KEY ROLE IN THE FUTURE MANAGEMENT OF THE WORLD ECONOMY. FURTHERMORE, JAPAN, LIKE CANADA, IS AN INDUSTRIALIZED COUNTRY WHICH SHARES
THE SAME BASIC DEMOCRATIC IDEALS AND DESIRES TO RESPOND EFFECTIVELY
TO AN INCREASINGLY COMPLEX WORLD ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL SITUATION.

IT FOLLOWS THAT THERE COULD BE MUTUAL ADVANTAGE THROUGH INCREASED
CONTACT ON INTERNATIONAL ISSUES.

IN ADDITION, JAPAN OFFERED A VAST DOMESTIC MARKET

FOR CANADIAN GOODS AND SERVICES AS WELL AS THE POTENTIAL TO

PARTICIPATE IN CANADIAN DEVELOPMENT THROUGH THE PROVISION, AMONG

OTHER THINGS, OF WELCOME INVESTMENT CAPITAL. WE THEREFORE

DREW THE OBVIOUS CONCLUSION: AN ENRICHED COOPERATIVE RELATIONSHIP

WITH JAPAN, WHICH ENVISAGED CLOSER TIES IN THE POLITICAL, ECONOMIC,

CULTURAL, SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNOLOGICAL FIELDS, WOULD SUPPORT

DIRECTLY CANADA'S OBJECTIVE OF BUILDING A SOUND DOMESTIC ECONOMY

AND REDUCING CANADA'S ECONOMIC VULNERABILITY.
