HIGHWAY SAFETY

RECALL OF GENERAL MOTORS PRODUCTS TO EXAMINE SUSPECTED DEFECTS

Mr. Barry Mather (Surrey): Mr. Speaker, may I direct a question to the Minister of Transport which has an important bearing on certain transportation matters. Bearing in mind the massive recall of millions of General Motors cars and trucks for examination of suspected defects, will the minister look into that situation as it affects Canadian consumers and the safety of Canadians.

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of Transport): The answer is yes, Mr. Speaker. The director of auto safety has already had meetings with officials of General Motors. Every necessary action will be taken in this country to assure the safety of the travelling public.

Mr. David MacDonald (Egmont): A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Considering recent disclosures, are members of the minister's department charged with auto safety prepared to introduce regulations setting standards of minimum safety in order to obviate in future incidents such as we have been discussing here.

INCOME TAX

APPLICATION TO INTEREST ON ANNUITIES BEFORE AND AFTER MATURITY
