The late Mr. Ewens was 41 years of age and had resided in West Toronto for over 25 years. He was, up to this year, the secretary of the Ward Seven, Ratepayers' Association, and his energetic efforts in their behalf made him a friend to all its members. He was in politics a Liberal, and was a member of the High Park avenue Methodist Churca, He is survived by a widow and five small children. Interment takes place on Thursday in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.


