

## Only Two Favorites in Front On Friday at Woodbine Park

### CABARET WINS IMPRESSIVELY THE PRINCE OF WALES HANDICAP

Southern Maid, Favorite, Outside Money in Feature Race at Woodbine—Big Card for Closing Day.

Friday furnished another good day's sport at Woodbine Park, the only two favorites won. The day was again ideal for the O.J.C. apparently having ordered the weather for the entire week. The crowd was once more above the standard, and the iron men were taxed to capacity. The impressive manner Cabaret won the Prince of Wales Handicap was the feature. He lay behind and made his run on the outside round and was an easy winner without effort. Marjorie A., long shot, was an easy second, and Panarella, second choice, just beat Kingly for the show. The favorite, Southern Maid, was a disappointment. The steeplechase was a fine contest, the Bryndown's effort was probably not her best. They were all backed except The African, and all stood up. Ragusa ran inside the west mound and Brooks claimed he was crowded, but the stewards had a deaf ear. Roland Pardee, Bryndown and Luskowski drove home together. There was a long delay starting the first. Collector ran away a mile with colors up. Miramichi bucked Nathan over his head and jogged a half. Trap threw his boy off, but didn't get away. The play was on Miramichi. Loftus and Co. were Belle, two outsiders, ran the two, with Fussy Wussy third. Urban Allen, favorite, won the two-year-old race all the way. Stir up beat Starex a length in a tidy struggle for the place. Cliff Edge started favorite in the fourth for maiden jockeys, but blew after leading for five furlongs. Then Capt. Elliott, third choice, won by a stretch run by a short length from Laura, the rest strung out. Diamond Cluster, favorite, won the sixth at every post, staying a length in front of Puritan Lass, that was second all round. Duke of Chester, second choice, eight lengths back in third position. Polly H., second choice, won the Buzz Around, second all round. Benjo Jim taking the third. Husky Lane was the pacemaker to the stretch. It is now up to closing day with the biggest card of the season, including the Toronto Cup, Hendrie Memorial Handicap and Street Railway Steeplechase.

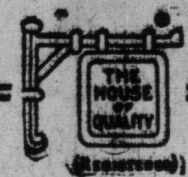

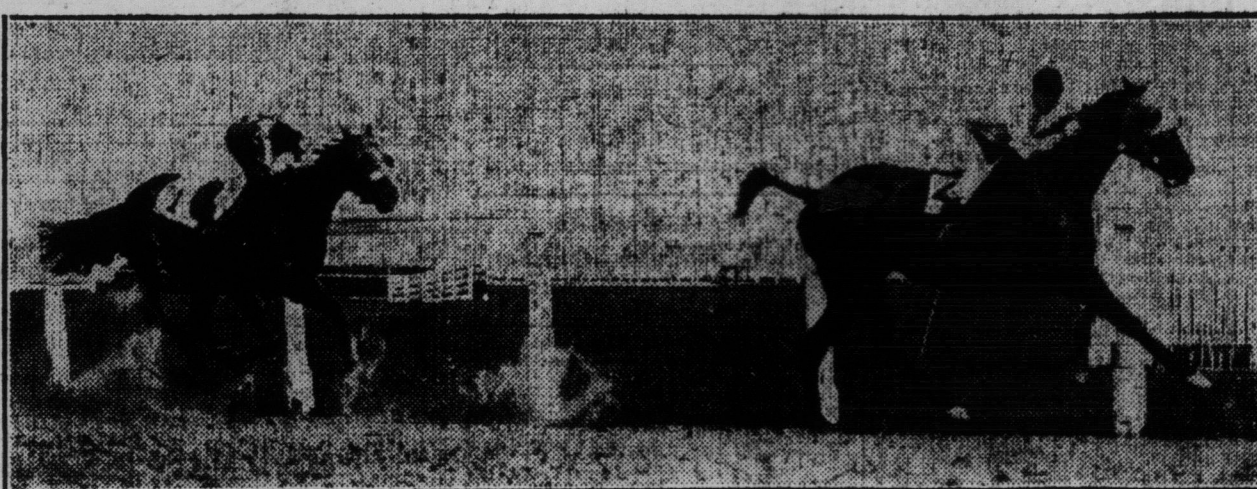

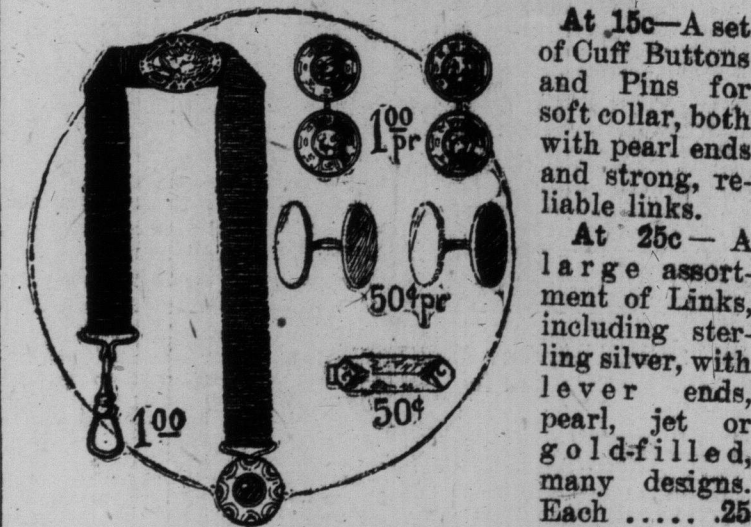
