CANADA FIRST-BUY AT HOME

Goods that are made in Canada should meet the needs of the people of Canada better than those made in another country. If they do not, it is the business of the Canadian manufacturer to see that they do. The style or finish of the article that is made in Canada may not be exactly to the liking of a purchaser, and it may be for that reason that such a large amount of goods are imported. Then, again, there is a popular fancy which seems to demand foreign-made goods just because they are foreign made. This attitude shows a lack of confidence in Canadian materials and Cana-

The point is, that if this fancy were done away with, if Canadians became satisfied with the goods such as they are made here the particular trade manufacturing those goods would be put on a better footing at once. On the other hand, in order to secure that trade the manufacturer must get closer to his patrons and turn out the style and finish that is wanted. There are some things that will never be made in Canada, that is, for

is not here are some things that will hever be made in Canada, that is, for a long time at least. In the first place the machinery for making them is not here, and in the second place, Canadians have not reached that stage where they are content to work at such a machine from day to day, carrying out their monotonous duties. Perhaps it is well that that is the case.

Time money was in better supply because of the relatively better position of the local banks, which are expected to report another large cash rain tomorto report another large cash gain tomor-row. Some thirty-day loans were made at 6½ per cent. on collateral of the high-est grade, but renewals again ranged from six to eight per cent, with the bulk of the business nearer the high figure. Foreign exchange moved erratically, opening well above yesterday's close, but receding in the later dealings. Brokers declared that foreign creditors seemed less inclined to extend impending payments, this being attributed to latest news from the theatre of war. Another news from the theatre of war. Another feature of the exchange market was the pronounced increase in dealings for Amsterdam, which has become an important centre for continental exchange. Much of today's business with Holland was in guilders and lires.

GOVERNMENT BONDS WEAK.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Foreign government bonds, have shown considerable weakness since the war broke out, selling by investors pressed for cash bringing big declines. Argentine 4's are quoted at 70, against 75 on July 30; Japanese 4's 's second series at 81's ex-dividend, 2's against 87 when the markets closed. Russian 5's have fallen from 92 to 89's. Chinese 1912's from 95 to 82, Peru preference bonds from 28 to 25, and Brazil scrip from 71 to 65. These losses are very unusual for investment securities, but, of course, the situation is most unusual.

BUSINESS MORE NORMAL.

The formal sanction of the stockholders to the increase of capital had no effect. Business in exchange is assuming, as regards certain countries, a fair amount of normality. New York was dealt in very closely at the rates of \$4.97 and \$4.974. Paris found buyers toward the close at \$25.06, and Holland was in keen demand, the rate of \$11.82 being paid.

DOWNWARD SWING IN CHICAGO WHEAT

Pit Closed Nervous-Feeling Prevailed Prices Were Too High for Export.

Canadian Press Despatch.

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—Bellef that advancing prices had checked the European demand resulted today in a downward swing for wheat. The market closed nervous, %c to %c under last night. Corn lost %c to %c net, and oats %c to %c. In provisions the outcome varied from 20c decline to a rise of 2%c.

Buying, supposed to be on foreign account, showed considerable activity after the wheat market had taken an early dip, the effect of rather heavy sales by a leading house, but the ensuing buige appeared to leave quotations without support. Bearish sentiment was increased by the announcement that exports from North America for the week had been nearly 2,000,000 bushels less than during the previous seven days.

Predictions of a decreased movement

Predictions of a decreased movement of wheat from first hands, especially in the northwest, were freely made. There was a sharp drop in receipts, both at Minneapolis and Winnipeg, and it was reported from the winter opp belt, too, that the disposition of farmers to hold wheat was pronounced.

Such advices, however, were largely offset by the fact that primary arrivals were yet a good deal in excess of the total a year ago.
