

CLAWS OF LION ON HUN'S THROAT

Writer From Peterhead Says Fleet
is Slowly Strangling
Germany.

Editor World: I have just received a letter from Peterhead, Scotland, from which I send you the following: "I have been nearly 12 months now in this remote part of the North Sea, and heaven knows when we shall see the last of it. Whatever there may be in other parts of the country, there are no pessimists here. It is impossible that we should be. Our navy was large and powerful when the war started—now it is monstrous, yet growing day by day. It is curious how the public seem to lose sight of the position. Yet the situation today is very similar to 110 years ago, a period referred to by Mahan in that memorable passage: 'Those distant storm-beaten ships, upon which the eyes of the grand army had never rested, which lay between Napoleon and the domination of the world; the navy which was pressing its claws deeper into Germany's throat and strangling her. Her fleet impotent; her flag and commerce swept from the seas; her wharves silent and deserted; her colonies torn from her; her export trade paralyzed; her head rival absolute mistress of the seas. As

to her submarines, most of them have been sent to Davy Jones's locker, except a few which have sneaked into the Mediterranean, where 'the devil will soon meet them. All these jermies in the press make us sick. If Ferdinand of Bulgaria was a constant reader of The Times no wonder he thought Germany would win. Yet if we continue to be patient and 'stick it' to the end our country will win sure enough. . . . And when this terrible struggle is over the Dominion should 'boom' as it has never done before.

HIGHLANDER COMPANY TO HOLD ROUTE MARCH

Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry
Counties Will Be Embraced
in Itinerary.

CORNWALL, Ont., Nov. 28.—Wal-
lace Watson, son of Mrs. A. G. Wat-
son, of Cornwall, who is attending
the Ontario College of Pharmacy, To-
ronto, has secured a lieutenantancy in
the British army.

Commencing at Vankleek Hill on
Tuesday, Nov. 30, the Scottish com-
pany of the 77th Battalion, C.E.F.,
Ottawa, under command of Major
Macgill, of Cornwall, will trek thru
the counties of Stormont, Dundas and
Glengarry in a march that will occupy
two weeks. Preceded by their pipe
band, they will arrive in Alexandria
on Wednesday, Dec. 1st, and will
spend the night at the army there.

Thursday they will march to Maxville,
where the public hall has been placed
at their disposal. Friday, Dec. 3, they
will proceed to Avonmore, and there
they will march into Cornwall on Sat-
urday, where they will remain over
Sunday. The remaining places to be
visited during the second week have
not yet been definitely decided.

The women of the Red Cross and
other patriotic societies will entertain
the soldiers at the various points.
The company is composed of a great
many from these counties, and the
visit is expected to create a stimulus
to further recruiting.

EX-PREMIER OF FRANCE SUMMONED BY DEATH

Jean Marie Ferdinand Sarrien
Held Portfolios in Four
Cabinets.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—Jean Marie Fer-
dinand Sarrien, who served as premier
in 1906, and who held portfolios in four
cabinets before forming the one which
succeeded the Rouvier ministry, died
suddenly today of cerebral hemor-
rhage.

M. Sarrien had not played a promi-
nent part in French politics since he
was succeeded as prime minister by
Eugene Georges Clemenceau. He
was born in 1840, and served as a cap-
tain of militia in the war of 1870-71.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male
over eighteen years old, may homestead
a quarter-section of available Dominion
land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Al-
berta. Applicant must appear in person
at the District Office, or at the District
Agency for the District. Entry by proxy
may be made at any Dominion Lands
Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain
conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and
cultivation of the land in each of three
years. A homesteader may live within
three miles of his homestead on a farm of
at least eighty acres, on certain condi-
tions. Duties—Must reside six months in
each of the three years, cultivate fifty
acres and erect a house worth \$2000.
The area of cultivation is subject to
reduction in case of rough, scrubby or
stony land. Live stock may be sub-
stituted for cultivation under certain con-
ditions.
