MINES AND MINING STOCKS
United States Production of Gold for
the Two Years 1897 and
1898 Compared.

DEVELOPMENT ON UPPER SEINE
Mr. Sweeney Believes in the Future
of the Island Falls
Country.

The director of the Washington mint has
received from the officials and agents of
the bureau their preliminary estimates of
the production of gold in the several pro-
ducing States and Territories of the United
States for the calendar year 1898. These
estimates, although subject to revision, are
deemed to be approximately correct. Nearly
all of the States show an increased produc-
tion, Colorado maintains and increases its
lead by a larger addition to its product
than in any previous year. The production
of California was considerably reduced by
prevailing drought which affected the out-
put of the placers, but the increase from
lode mines has slightly more than offset
this reduction. Estimates given below are
compared with the final estimate for the
production of the same States and Terri-
tories in 1897:

Mining on the Upper Seine.
Mr. Roy Sweeney, a son of Col. Sweeney of
Toronto, and for the past two years identi-
fied with the gold fields of Northwestern
Ontario, is spending a few days at his
home preparatory to going back to the
woods.
Mr. Sweeney was for a time engaged of
the Hammond Reef, but for a year past
he has been superintending the develop-
ment of the Roy property, which is situated
about two miles from Island Falls on the
Upper Seine River. The Roy boasts a four-
foot vein of schist, and upon this Mr. Sweeney
has sunk a shaft 100 feet to a level of
100 feet, and has now a 40-foot level. A
considerable surface work in the way of
spraying and test-ditching has also been
accomplished.
A good field of development work is
looked for in this immediate section this
year. On the "Old Redditors" property
the shaft is run down 140 feet, with
large figures. In our opinion, these rocks

SHOOT TO KILL, HE SAYS

Chief of Police Kipley of Chicago is
Determined to Rid the City of
Thugs and Thieves.

KILLING OF POLICEMAN WALNER

Has Decided the Chief Not to Use
Gingerly Methods Hereafter in
Taking Hold of Highwaymen.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—Chief Joseph Kipley has
instructed the Chicago police to "shoot to
kill" when it becomes necessary in dealing
with highwaymen and notorious thugs.
"I want to say to every police officer in
the city of Chicago," said Chief Kipley to-
day, "that when they have positive proof
that a robbery or any outrage has been
committed and they are pursuing the men
and these desperadoes turn about when or-
dered to halt and retreat or display arms,
the officers must shoot, and shoot to kill.
Such men are desperate, and there is only
one way to handle them, and that is in
the same way they will deal with the
robbers and thugs."
This determination to clear Chicago of
highwaymen, burglars and footpads at any
cost is the direct result of the killing of
Detective Edward J. Walner by six high-
waymen, who had held up the dry goods
store of Walner on Lincoln-street, last night, and the
subsequent wounding of Policeman John McCon-
nelly.

"KEEP A DRY EYE ON THE SAUCER"

Pavilion Temperance Meetings Un-
supported—About One in Eight
Persons Notes the Plate.

Plain truths were plainly spoken yester-
day to the audience in the Pavilion.
"Last-President J. S. Robertson talked of
"Home Affairs." During the ten years'
history of the league its promoters, he said,
had gone on the principle of taking the pub-
lic into their confidence. In many respects
the work of the organization had assumed
large proportions, and using the term in its
proper sense, it might be said that the league
had been successful. At the Pavilion meet-
ings during recent years had reached a size, that the building at
times was too small to accommodate the
people and the impression had gone abroad
that large meetings were being made out of
these Sunday meetings. This, he was believed
had something to do in causing the
council to raise the rent first from \$10 to
\$13 a Sunday, and then for this year to
\$15. Citizens talked of these meetings as
money-makers. What were the facts? With
the exception of last season the collections
during the ten years had never been suffi-
cient to cover the expenses of the season.
Last season the expenses were paid out of
collections and a small balance left over.
True, the league was promising to pay all
its accounts, and said Mr. Robertson, the
resolve of the members is that when that
cannot be done they will close shops, but
the extra funds come from a few friends
who had generously supported league work.
Finally 21 meetings were held in the year
this year seven had been held so far, or
eight, including that of yesterday. In only
one case had the collections covered the
expenses. In the other seven
there had been a shortage each Sunday
ranging from \$21 to \$26. If in the remain-
ing 14 meetings the losses should average
up the same it would mean that at the
end of the season they would be out
\$500 behind. The committee during the
past week had gone seriously into the ques-
tion of raising the rent, but as now pre-
sented, was the outcome of that meeting. Mr. Ro-
bertson said that the suggestion had been
made that the meetings be stopped, but he
and others, knowing what had been done in
past years, believed that such a statement
of facts ought not to be placed before the
public, to bring forth a hearty response. He
said that the three collections of the year
had not been a gain. (b) That subscriptions
be made in the form of a collection, and
used for the year, amounting to nearly \$200.
(c) That those in attendance at these meet-
ings be more liberal in their collections, and
as a matter of fact hardly one in eight con-
tributed to the plate.
There were a number of donations in money
and cheques were handed to the platform
but \$150 is still needed to cover the short-
age. Col. H. H. Hadley, the speaker of the af-
ternoon, is a man fully six feet in height,
of proportionate build, forceful as a speak-
er, and warm in his sympathies. He has
done a number of years of mission work among
the downtown.
