THE LOSS OF THE LABRADOR

The Dominion Liner Ran on Mackenzie

Rock-Off the Scottish Coast

in a Thick Fog.

THOSE ON BOARD SAVED IN BOATS.

One Boat Load Landed at the Light-

house and the Balance Picked

Up by German Steamer.

Tobermory, Scotland, March 2.—Investi-

gation into the wreck of the British steam-

er Labrador, from St. John, N.B., on Feb.

18, by way of Halifax on Feb. 20, for Liv-

erpool, shows that she ran ashore about

four miles from Skerryvore on Wednesday

morning.

Captain Erskine, her commander, has

sent the following despatch to the agents

of the steamer at Liverpool:

"Labrador ran on Mackenzie Rock in a

thick fog at 7 o'clock yesterday morning.

Four miles from Skerryvore. The ship was

caught amidships, the seas breaking over

a hulk and all on board left the steamer

in safety.

The passengers and crew lost everything

they possessed.

Captain Erskine endeavored to save the

hulk, but was obliged to abandon them

owing to the vessel threatening to break

up. The women and children were put in

the first boat, in charge of the fourth offi-

cer, the other passengers were placed in

the second boat, under the command of

the second officer.

The crew of the Labrador then took the

other boats and as they left the steamer

was pouring into the sea from her

hulk.

Met the Steamer Viking.

After three and a half hours had expired

the boats met the steamer Viking from

Norway, which took them on board, though

the operation was dangerous, owing to the

Viking's swell, the seas breaking over the

Viking's funnel.

When the Labrador was last seen she was

passing the wreck of the steamer. The pas-

sengers of the wrecked steamer are full of

praise for the Labrador's officers and crew

for the conduct of the captain of the

Viking.

The passengers of the Labrador have been

sent ashore at the hotels here and at

private houses.

The owners of the Labrador have caused

the wreck to be despatched to the

scene of the wreck in order to salvage the

cargo of the steamer.

DISCOVERY ABOUT JUPITER.

Professor Hough Believes the Plan-

et Rotates in Separate En-

velopes or Strata.

Chicago, March 2.—Prof. George W.

Hough, the astronomer at Dearborn Obser-

vatory, in Evanston, has made public a

new discovery in regard to the surface ro-

tations of the planet Jupiter, which is com-

pletely at variance with the existing be-

lief. It is the general tenet of astronomers

and the statements are embodied in the

most recent text books on the science, that

the surface of Jupiter is covered by a

solid mass of clouds, which is supposed to

be similar to that of the sun, being quick-

er near the equator and slowest in the higher

latitudes.

Hough's conclusions upon a long re-

cord of observations, extending over

twenty years, and which he has just com-

pleted, Prof. Hough announces his belief

that the surface of the planet Jupiter is

not a solid mass, but is composed of many

layers, or strata, which rotate at different

rates.

Prof. Hough further discovered in the

long series of observations that the spots

shift in longitude as well as having a ro-

tary movement, and this also supports the

strata theory, evidencing the great

instability of the surface, and strengthening

Prof. Hough's belief of many years

that Jupiter is in a gaseous or plastic state.

FRENCH EYES OPENED.

Dangerous Undertaking for France

to Pursue a Coalition Policy

Against the Anglo-Saxons.

Paris, March 2.—The Temps in a leader-

ship points out that there is a stronger

bond between England, the United States

and Germany than Frenchmen care to ad-

peace of mind.
