MACKENZIE ASKS FOR MORE. What the Ontario and Rainy Rive Company Already Has Is Not

Enough For Him.

It is only a small matter of about a million and a quarter of dollars more that Mr. McKenzie and his friends want at present from the country to build that Ontario and Rainy River Railway. The Dominion Gov-ernment has already granted \$6000 a mile for about 80 miles of road, and the Ontario

ernment has already granted \$6000 a mile for about \$0 miles of road, and the Ontario Government has recently granted a bonus of \$4000 a mile for the same portion, and about \$1000 a mile for about 200 additional miles. Now the Dominion Government will at an early date be respectfully requested to put up \$6000 a mile for the portion of the road that it has not yet subsidized. What is granted and what is asked would total up to over \$2,000,000 of public money. Mr. James Conmee, the corpulent and eversmiling Provincial member from Wests-Algoma, chattering with The World at the Rossin House last night, said he was going down to Ottawa to-day or to-morrow in the interest of New Ontario.

Talking about the Ontario and Rainy River Railway, he pointed out that there were great difficulties to be undertaken in its construction, and consequently great expense. For about three miles the road had to be built across water. The C.P.R. had surveyed the country through which the new road is being built, but had abandoned that route owing to difficulties they had encountered. The Government at Ottawa has already been acquainted with the desire of the company for another million or so, but has not been waited upon in a formal way. A deputation will present the company's views very shortly.
