DEAD IDENTIFIED. Schenectady, N. Y., June 9.—The following dead have been identified: Mrs. Nellie Crouse, Utica, N. Y., her 12-year-old son and her infant Mrs. Watson H. Bowne, Utlca, her 12-year-old grandson, Daniel Crouse, and her 20-months-old grand-daughter, Marion Crouse, Martin Doyle of Albany, engineer of the express.

Doyle died at his post. Today was his 50th birthday. It is alleged he ran past three different warning signals.

Schenectady, N. Y., June 9 .- At least 11 persons were killed and 21 were in-Only two of the dead have so far been identified. They are Martin Doyle of Albany, engineer on the express train, and a 2-year-old baby, supposed to be the child of Nellis Crouse of Utica. Mr. Crouse was removed to a hospital here unconscious, and the child was identified by the Pullman conductor.

Among the dead also was a man believed to be W. J. Zuill of Syracuse. The other dead were two unidentified men, one boy and an elderly woman. The injured so far identified are all New York and Massachusetts people. Car Split in Two.
