Justice Riddell in dismissing the suit says: "His rights against the railway company are none the less that his manners towards his fellow-passengers were those of an ill-conditioned and selfish boor."

TOWN AND TOWNSHIP COUNCILS FIRST MEET

Scarboro Will Appear Two Assessors—Collegiate Board Meets in Junction.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Jan. 13.—(Special.)—In a bright new council chamber the inaugural meeting of the town council took place yesterday morning. Rev. T. Beverley Smith opened the proceedings with prayer, and while Mayor Baird delivered his inaugural address, the keynote of which was property and progress for the growing Junction. He regarded the improvement of the waterworks as the most important question which would be dealt with by the council in 1908, and went so far as to hint that by gravitation the citizens might get pure water from the artesian wells in Whitchurch Township. His worship recommended that an application be made to the Dominion Railway Board for an order compelling the railways to provide rates at all their stations within the limits of the town. He recommended annexation with Toronto.

Mayor Baird was glad that the street railway services had been resumed to Keele-street. In his opinion the town had a good case against the company to compel it to run to Keele-street all day. In case this was lost on appeal, he would recommend that action be taken by the town to cancel the present agreement with the company on the ground of partial failure of consideration. The chairman of the various committees of the year are: Executive, Councillor Armstrong; works, Whetter; vice-chairman works, Maher; property, Armstrong; vice-chairman property, Sheppard; court of revision, Ford.

At the adjourned meeting of the new council, J. R. Hall, late member, was appointed to fill the vacancy made by the retirement of J. C. Smith on the collegiate board. Charles Topping was reappointed to the board of health for the three-year term, and T. J. Smythe was named to succeed W. H. Ford. John Baird and W. Wiley were reappointed as assessors, with \$100 per year salary each.

A committee of industry was named as follows: Councillor R. C. Jennings (chairman), Alex. Hane and W. W. Howell. The mayor made application for the position of medical health officer, but the matter was laid over until the inaugural meeting of the board of health. Councillor Maher and the provincial audit were made of the books at present in the hands of the treasurer.

The motion was lost. The collegiate board met to-night, with J. MacEachern in the chair, and received the treasurer's statement for 1907. The receipts totaled \$14,263.78. The expenditures include \$8983 for salaries, \$800 caretaker, \$280 secretary, \$200 treasurer, and \$400 fuel supply. Income includes students' fees \$162.50, P. S. Board for first term pupils \$1202, legislative grant \$304.07, County of Peel grant \$322.24, City of Toronto \$820.47.

It was decided to hold the inaugural meeting on the first Wednesday in February. The use of the assembly hall was granted to the Old Boys' Association on Feb. 2, when the annual dinner will be held. J. G. Wright sold his drug business today to W. T. Pearce, Ph.D., of Winnipeg, for \$7500. Mr. Wright will devote all his time as representative of the Kelpion Company, in which firm he is interested.

The public school board will hold its last meeting for 1907 to-morrow night. The management committee met to-night and received applications from the caretakers of Weston-avenue and Annette-street schools for increases in salaries. As the board has been fixing the scale laid down by the Toronto Board of Education, it was decided not to change the scale.

Two little girls, taking home a parcel of meat along Hook-avenue to-night, were stopped by a stranger, who snatched the parcel and ran away. The police have been notified and the highway-looking stranger is being looked for.

Real estate in the Junction is dropping. A man of Louisa-street built a house last summer which cost him \$2500. He parted with the house Saturday for \$1600.

There was not an absentee from the council board to-night and the address of Mayor McMillan, which was intensely practical and dealt with many matters vital to the welfare of the town.

His worship expressed pleasure at the presence of a number of ratepayers, and urged even greater interest in the municipal work of the council. He referred to the necessity of a snow by-law, commended the work of the fire and night committee under Chairman Berry, urged economy, but withal a liberal administration of town affairs and touched on the necessity for a new town hall.

The mayor's inaugural speech was a model of brevity and good sense. The different committees will be: All Were There.

Water and light—Berry (chairman). Roads and property—Lyonde (chairman). Hind, Baker, Linton and Abbott. Finance—Phelan (chairman). Hind, Hodgson, Berry and Johnston.

A feature of the meeting was the action of Councillor Baker in moving for a special committee to again approach the council in an attempt to secure annexation. The name of Councillor Phelan was suggested as one of the finance promptly turned down the suggestion and declared that the Town of East Toronto had already gone for the same in that direction. In this he was supported by Councillor Abbott, but nevertheless the motion carried.

The sum of \$40,000 was agreed upon as the amount to be borrowed from the Metropolitan Bank to meet current expenditure for the year.

A motion introduced a bylaw for the holding of municipal elections as in the City of Toronto and York Township was carried.

Solicitor Grant was instructed to prepare a snow bylaw for next meeting. Deputy Reeve Brown was instructed to limit the number of hotel licenses at next meeting.
