School Bag Making The small boy may not be able to extract so much pleasure as the "grown up" from the demonstration of making school bags where two machines are in operation on the sheepskin, stitching, binding and shaping, until you see the neat bag which is to carry Johnny's books and which may hold the arithmetic and grammar of a fu-

As the pile of bags from the whirring machines mounts high, the quantity of wisdom they may inclose impresses the crowd looking on at this process, from leather to learning, the riveter completes the work and the bag is all ready for the Canadian school boy or his sister.

There is a kind of three-in-one manufactory, a few steps farther on, where Book Making: the final processes in the making of a book are a source of information and interest to thousands, who have probably never thought before, as they opened the cover of a book, what its manufacture implies. The folded pages of the Methodist Hymn Book are placed on the stitching machine and the stout threads in their six huge reels get busily to work on the pages beneath until the book is ready for the process of binding. Then there is the paring machine, all ready to cut the covers which are to make the unclad volume presentable. As you compare the coverless books with the leather-bound, giltedged volume which emerges finally from expert hands, you see that the process of to-day reduced the labors of long ago to a minimum of dexterous effort. The red stain of the edges, with the gilt finish, represents the product of centuries of experiment and invention.

It is a far cry from the ancient hymns, written by the monk's hand, in the quiet abbey, to those modern hymn books turned out by the hundreds between Sundays.
