The Salvation Army has brought most of these English to our land and from the very worst spots in older England have been collected to defile our beloved Canada.

Spirited Replies.

On the order of the day being called in the house of commons this afternoon, Hon. A. E. Kemp, acting minister of military and naval affairs (South York) made spirited and the stoutheaded letter from Toronto.

He carried no doubt, and backed up his assertion with data furnished by Brigadier-General Maclean, who had been in the South York volunteers who have gone to the front. The majority of whom were British-born, and the attacks made on the British-born in Canada, he said:

"I think I would in order, at least as a matter of privilege, to refer to the remarks made by the acting minister of military and naval affairs, one Robert Hazleton, which was mentioned in another part of this building. The writer of this letter lives in the house of commons, and having read the reflections he passed on those who were rejected when they came to enlist in Toronto, I have only this to say: The constituency of South York, in which he lives, which is rejected, is over 8000 enlisted men to the front, and the bulk of them are British-born, and this occasion to pay tribute to the loyalty and to the sacrifice of the British-born in Canada, and especially to those in my own riding, which apply to soldiers being recruited in any other part of Canada, as conditions are very similar in other parts of the country. (Applause.)"

"In answer to the statements,"

Hon. Mr. Kemp spoke in part as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is in the public interest to read the statement which was made in the house in reference to the recruiting of soldiers, particularly in the City of Toronto. According to the statement of April 12, the Hon. Mr. Choquette made some very extraordinary statements in regard to the degeneracy of the soldiers, particularly those who are recruited in the City of Toronto. The statement, however, applies to soldiers being recruited in any other part of Canada, as conditions are very similar in other parts of the country. (Applause.)"

"In answer to the statements,"

Hon. Mr. Kemp spoke in part as follows:

"I shall not read what the senator said, because his remarks have been published in the press and we all know what they know."

Later on he referred to the letter to the Hon. Mr. Choquette, which the writer signs himself Robert Hazleton. The statements in this letter are extreme and unfounded, and the whole letter can be judged by one remark in it. This letter refers to the Rev. Mr. Hinkins in this way:

"Who Rev. (?) Hinkins is a faker. He is an adventurer and to the native-born he is known as a 'Broncho Bullhockey' always blowing his own horn."

"I desire to say that I am acquainted with the Rev. Mr. Hinkins, and am acquainted with the house he lives in. He is a very highly-respected clergyman, and is known as such from one end of this country to the other. Therefore, so far as the letter from Hazleton is concerned, it does not serve as a proper pretext for any remarks which Senator Choquette made."

Gen. Logie's Letter.

"I have received a telegram from the commanding officer at Toronto, Brigadier-General Logie, and he says this: '20,380 men have enlisted from Toronto, Ontario, and various parts of the Dominion. Mounted Rifles states that there were no rejections from the detail of Body Guard, Light Horse, or 2nd Dragoons, but 40 or 50 men in Brantford detachment were rejected for under-size.'"

Depth reports that 1336 rejections were made by his medical officer for chest measurements not being in proportion to height and weight. Medical examinations in this division were very strict and regulations absolutely adhered to."

"This causes an accumulation of men who have been previously rejected applying in each succeeding unit in the hope of getting past the doctor. The recruiting depot is at work now."
