TORONTO BEEKEEPERS HOLD FIELD DAY

Toronto beekeepers held their annual field day at the apiary of Miss. Trevarrow, Meadowvale, on the holiday. The program was made up of talks and demonstrations by practical beekeepers and was intended to be helpful and instructive to the city man who kept a few bees in his backyard and looked after them in his spare

E. R. Root, the editor of Gleanings of the noted authorities of the United States on the subject, showed how he would hive a "pound package." These parcels of bees are put up in Texas and the southern states and sent all over the union and Canada and are used to make desired increase of colonies. A one-pound package such as Mr. Root used, contains about 5,000 bees, all safely caged for transit, but
