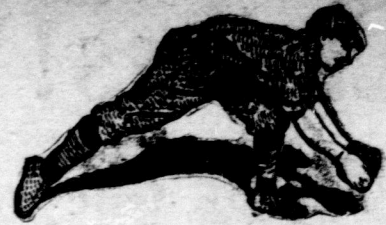

Washington, May 21.—It was strictly a struggle of southpaw side-wheelers, Sleever vs. Burns, and Burns won by one, Washington shutting out Detroit, 1 to 0.

Only three Tigers reached first.

Only seven Senators arrived there in safety.

Only six hits were made, two by Detroit and four by Washington.

Only four walked.

Nobody was hit.

There were no errors on either side.

For those who like that kind of a game this was a peachering. Still, if Jennings does not bring so many scalps home he certainly will reach Detroit with a sack full of money.

In spite of a sky black with threats and an occasional drizzle the bleachers were packed, while the other stands were almost all filled.

Never Even Threatened.

The champions never even threatened to score. In the first engagement Crawford singled cleanly to center, with two out, and the best Cobb could do after the audience had generously applauded his arrival at the plate was to pop a high one to short.

Second Coughlin walked and from that point to the ninth no inning saw more than three Tigers come to bat. In the last season Detroit raised the cry, "It's not too late yet—Mullin to bat."

And Mullin did go to bat for Sleever, but he only mortified himself and apparently gratified a whole lot of people by striking out. After that McIntyre beat out an infield fly, but to McBride, but Schaefer and Crawford, although they both hit the ball almost to the fence, sent it directly into the fielders' hands.

Washington's lone tally was honestly earned. In the second inning Ganley singled and DeLahanty sent him home with a two-base drive to the clubhouse in center field.

The fielding, though flawless, was not particularly striking, save in the fourth, when DeLahanty made a high jump and bare-hand catch of one of those celebrated line drives of Ty Cobb's, a catch good for a column description in any Washington paper.

Jennings, in a neat blue serge suit, set in the front of the grandstand and passed the time in an occasional smiling exchange with the fans near him.

"Pretty sweet boy, that Burns, eh, Hughey?" said one of the gloating Washingtonians.

"I can't tell in one game," replied Jennings inasmuch.

"Why not?"

"Because to be the real thing he has got to go nine innings against us every time we face him for the season, and there are few of them who have done that. You know that, don't you?"
