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that notwithing (contrary of Rawdon,

this Committee cannot see any reason for altering their opinion as expressed in their last Report.

"With reference to Weymouth the Sub-Committee recommend a grant of \$20.

"The Sub-Committee notice with much regret that the people there do not make up the amount promised by them to their Missionary."

The Executive Committee resolved that the Glebe and Parsonage at Rawdon be valued at the rent of £35 per annum, and that an additional grant be made to the Missionary there of \$60 for the year 1864.

The grant to Weymouth was agreed to.

\$60 was granted toward the new Church at the Forks, Windsor.

A former grant having lapsed in consequence of not being claimed within the appointed time, a grant of \$80 was made toward the Parsonage at New Ross.

Mar. 17, 1865.—It was resolved that the next annual general meeting be held in October, 1865.

April 21, 1865.—The Secretary was directed to inform the Missionaries who are in part supported by this Society, that their bills would not be honored by the Society for the quarter ending June 30, unless their returns of Parochial Statistics were made for the preceding year.

A grant of \$40 toward paying the expense of missionary visits to Caledonia was renewed for one year from April 1st, 1864.

Notice of motion was given for a pension from the W. and O. Fund for the child of the late Rev. J. Woods.

May 19, 1865.—An interesting report was submitted, from the Missionary visiting Caledonia, of his labors in that Mission.

The grant was renewed for six months from April 1st, 1865, toward paying his expenses.

The sum of \$80 was granted on the usual terms toward a new Church at Tangier.

The motion for a pension to the child of the late Rev. J. Woods was deferred to the Annual General Meeting.

The Bishop having drawn the attention of the Committee to the death of the Venble. the Archdeacon,—It was resolved

"That this Committee desire unanimously to record their sense of the loss which the D. C. S. has sustained by the removal of its first Vice President, who from its commencement had taken a lively interest in its
