Subscriptions and ordinary donations show a slight increase. The other chief items of increase are: pay patients, \$1,430.30; interest and rents, \$1,975.08.

There have been received in legacies during the year: Estate Robert Smyth, \$100 ; Estate John Phelan,  $\$4,\!594.27$  ; Estate George C. Hamilton (balance of bequest), \$55,000; Estate Mrs. Charles Phillips, \$10,000; Estate Mrs. Andrew Stuart, \$900; Estate Mrs. Mary Dow, \$18,000; Estate George Armstrong, \$175; Estate John Duncan, \$10,000; Estate George Ross, M.D., \$500.

The total number of in-door patients treated to a conclusion during the year was 2,360—an increase of 31 over the preceding year. Of these, 172 remained over from the preceding year, and 2,360 were admitted during the year 1892-93; 180 patients remained in Hospital at the end of the year.

The average daily number of patients in the wards during the year was 163. The average number of days in Hospital per patient was 24.75, being greater than last year by 1.41 days. The aggregate number of days in Hospital by all patients was 58,437, an increase of 1,190 days over last year.
