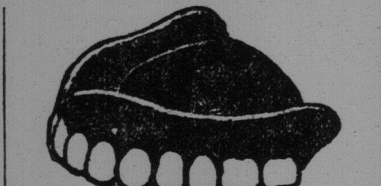

LATE LOCALS

There is a flow of water running on Carmarthen street, near Princess street. The river department has been notified. The Lunenburg, N. S., schooner Narika arrived in port this morning from Pictou, do, Porto Rico, with 264 puncheons, 23 tierces and 68 barrels of new molasses for Percy B. Evans.

Donaldson line steamer Alcides, Captain Fraser, arrived this morning from Glasgow with a full cargo for city merchants. She has 20,150 bags Scotch hard coal.

The harbor front presented a busy appearance this morning. Within the past twenty-four hours a large fleet of vessels have arrived, including two steamships and ten schooners.

DOMINION DAY ATTRACTIONS

Pleasure Seekers Will Have Good List of Amusements and Excursions to Choose From.

Indications are that Dominion Day, July 2nd, will be observed very quietly in St. John. So far as can be learned the most exciting happenings on that occasion will be ball games, theatrical performances, excursions to the park or out of the city.

The yachtmen will have their annual regatta on Saturday, June 30th, and at 12 o'clock, noon, on Monday the start will be made from the Cedars, finishing at Millidgeville. The prizes will be articles of equipment. The officers of the regatta are Commodore Robt. Thomson, Geo. B. Hegan and Dr. A. H. Merrill.

The big firemen's tournament and Old Home week at Fredericton is expected to attract a large crowd from this city. It is expected that about sixty St. John firemen will accompany the soldiers' band, and the ceremonial of trooping the colors will be carried out on the square.

The members of the New Brunswick Auto Association will also go up in their motor cars and will form an interesting part of the street parade.

The big political picnic at Gagetown is expected to attract a very large number, as the speakers will be all well known politicians, and a good time is guaranteed. The various river boats will, as usual, run excursions to different points on the river and no doubt a large number will avail themselves of the opportunity of thus spending a day.

A ball game between the St. Johns and a fast team from outside is being arranged for the afternoon on the Victoria grounds.

In the Opera House Miss Roselle Knott and an excellent company will present Cousin Kate both afternoon and evening. The small boy and the firecrackers will provide the necessary noise.

HE FELL TO HIS DEATH

H. P. Weidig Killed by Falling from Royal Hotel Window Last Night.

H. P. Weidig, of the firm of Chas. Hoyer & Co., manufacturing chemist, New York and Newark, N. J., fell from a second story window of the Royal Hotel about 12:45 this morning and was instantly killed, his skull being fractured. He was in St. John on a pleasure trip.

At 1:10 o'clock Police Constable Orland Ward, going on his rounds, found the body on the Germain street sidewalk. He immediately notified the hotel people and coroner Berryman. The latter, after an examination of the body, summoned a team from Golding's stable and had the body removed to the morgue.

While awaiting the arrival of the conveyance the coroner made an examination of the room the deceased had occupied but found nothing that would indicate other than that the man had fallen out of the window. Mr. Weidig was a German and not being able to speak English fluently, was very much pleased to meet G. A. H. Muller, accountant for J. O'Regan, who is of the same nationality. They were together for some time last evening and Mr. Muller left for his home about 10:15 leaving Mr. Weidig in the bar at the Royal.

Mr. Weidig came to this city via the D. A. R. by way of Yarmouth, Digby and the Prince Rupert, arriving here on Monday. He had informed A. C. Currie, of the D. A. R. that he intended to bring his family from Newark, N. J. His home, he was greatly pleased with the Nova Scotia town.

THE MAN IN UNIFORM

Was Not a Southern Potentate But an Attache of the Boston Dental Parlors.

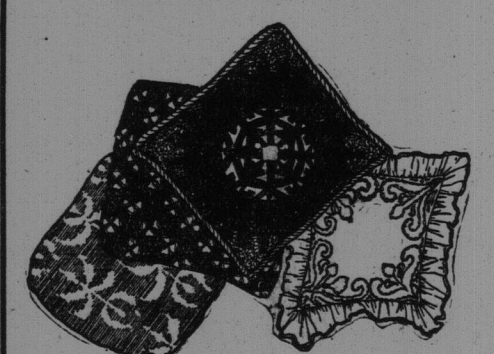
