SHIPBUILDING RE-VIVAL IN NEW BRUNSWICK

(Board of Trade Journal for September.)

Saint John was a little slow in lining up for shipbuilding—considering that it was one of the four biggest ship-owning ports in the world forty years ago—but now that it has entered the race in earnest satisfactory results are anticipated.

There are at present three shipbuilding yards either in active operation or in process of being laid out in this city. Grant & Horne, Courtenay Bay, have laid the keel for a large wooden steamer with a carrying capacity of 8,000 tons, and about 3,000 men are rushing the work of construction. The keel, composed of British Columbia fir, is 280 feet long. Native timber will be largely used in the building of this steamer.

A second steamer will be put on the stocks immediately upon the completion of the present ship. This yard is now well equipped with building plant.

D. A. Saker & Co., who acquired the Warner property on the Strait Shore, are making preparations for the building of a number of wooden sailing craft. This firm anticipates taking up steel shipbuilding when the time is opportune.

The St. John Ship-Building Company, of which Thomas Nagle is manager, and which numbers among its directors some of the wealthiest men of eastern Canada, have negotiated for a yard site on Courtenay Bay adjacent to the Grant & Horne yard, and are now having it surveyed by marine engineers. This company propose building ships of both wood and steel.

At Moss Glen Peter McIntyre of St. John has a schooner of large tonnage well advanced.

The Eureka Shipbuilding Company has been incorporated, with Frank Ingalls, Joseph E. Gaskill, Frederick S. McLaughlin, Frank L. Lakeman and N. Marks Mills as provisional directors. Capital stock, \$25,000; head office, North Head, Grand Manan.

C. T. White & Co., lumbermen, have established a shipbuilding yard at Alma, Albert county, and are working upon a schooner.

HARVEST REPORT FROM
BRITAIN BRIGHT; GLOOMY FROM GERMAN EMPIRE

London, Sept. 10.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press).—An official statement from the food production department gives a reassuring view of the harvest prospects in the British Isles, and by way of contrast, a summary of the gloomy situation in enemy countries.

In England, it is stated, recent reports of damage from rain and storm were heavily exaggerated. "While the recent storms damaged crops in some areas, there is, speaking generally, not the slightest ground for public anxiety or alarm," says the statement.

In Germany, on the other hand, the information received by the British agricultural authorities is that "the crops are not only exceedingly bad in the best areas of the German empire, but the whole harvest of the Central Powers will in all probability prove disastrous in consequence of the violent weather which has prevailed over western Europe."

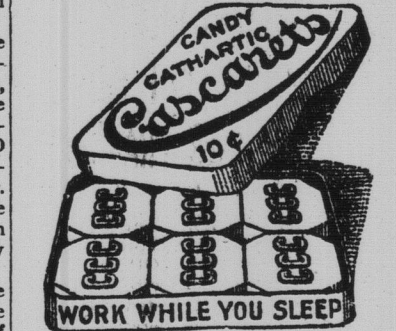
HARD LABOR FOR LIFE FOR SOKHOMLINOFF

More Wasted Than Would Feed Army

Food Valued at \$7 Per Head of the Population Goes Yearly to Garbage

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—The enormous wastage in food throughout the dominion is indicated in statistics compiled by the food controller. It is estimated that, owing to carelessness and inefficiency, there is wasted in garbage every year food to the value of \$85,000,000, or about \$7 a head of the total population.

By complete national organization and rigid economy, it is thought, the cost of living can be reduced by five cents per day for each individual. Counting in the elimination of garbage waste, this would mean an annual saving of \$23.55 per head, or a national grand total saving of \$204,400,000, enough to feed an army of one million men for a year.

The estimated preventable waste in garbage alone is more than sufficient to feed all Canada's soldiers overseas. Were one million Canadian families to save one slice of bread per week there would be a weekly saving of 71,290 one-pound loaves—enough to feed 3-1-3 divisions of soldiers for a day.
