The new dominion war loan placed on the market here, as elsewhere in Canada today, has been received with evident enthusiasm by investors. The brokers report many inquiries and already there are a large number of subscriptions. It is apparent that a considerable sum will be invested in St. John and there are prospects of some very large subscriptions here.

ONE ADRIATIC ARRIVES

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 22—The British freighter Adriatic from Kyrenai, Greece, Oct. 18, for Philadelphia, passed in the Delaware Capes during the night. Her arrival eliminates her from the report circulated a week ago today that a steamer by that name had been sunk in the European war zone by a submarine.

OUT OF DANGER ZONE

London, Nov. 22—The Italian liner Verona, from Italian ports for New York, which on Saturday reported by wireless that she was being pursued by a submarine and afterwards that she had eluded the undersea craft in a fog, is now safely out of the Mediterranean.

LARGE FLOTILLA OF BRITISH UNDER WATER CRAFT TO BALTIC

Copenhagen, Nov. 22—The passage of a large flotilla of British submarines, variously estimated at from ten to twenty-five, into the Baltic is given here as an explanation of the recent naval activity in the Cattagat, where both German and British destroyer flotillas have been sighted. According to current reports a powerful British squadron conveyed the submarines to the entrance of the Cattagat at the Skaw, the northernmost point of the Jutland coast. The large ships stopped there, while the destroyers conveyed the submarines as far as Eshinore, at the narrowest part of the sound, whence the submarines alone proceeded into the Baltic.

LONDON GLOBE MAKES APOLOGY AND RESUMES

London, Nov. 22—The Globe, which was suppressed by the police on November six, for insisting War Secretary Kitchener had resigned, notwithstanding the warning of the official press bureau of the newspaper and governmental authorities concerning the suspension, closing with an apology for the Globe and withdrawal of its "regrettable" misstatement.

THE MONTENEGRINS REFUSE THE ENEMY

Paris, Nov. 22—An official communication issued by the Montenegrin army headquarters, was given out here today as follows: "Our Sanjak army was attacked on November 20 along the entire front, more energetically on the Drina and Lim rivers. Everywhere the enemy was repulsed. Our Sanjak troops continue to install themselves in their new positions. On the other fronts there were artillery battles."

DODD'S KIDNEY PILLS. THE ZEALANDIA CASE. Washington, Nov. 22—Officers of the battleship Kentucky at Progress, Mex., have reported that the American steamer Zealandia was one-quarter of a mile inside the three-mile limit when recently forcibly searched by a boarding party from a British cruiser, and therefore was in a neutral port.
