WIFE FORMERLY WAS MISS V. WHITTAKER

A. W. Sutor-Hutton, Dead in Montreal, Married Niece of W. M. McKay

Arthur W. Sutor-Hutton, Canadian representative of the London publication, Canada, and widely known advertising man, died on Tuesday in the Montreal Homoeopathic Hospital where he was taken suffering from pneumonia on Sunday. He was in his 52nd year.

In the passing of Mr. Sutor-Hutton, a distinguished journalist, his lost one of its best known and most travelled representatives.

Son of a distinguished military family, Mr. Hutton was educated at Sandhurst. He was commissioned in the army and served in the Far East for 15 years. He then resigned his commission and took up his residence in Australia until the Boer War broke out, when he enlisted with the Australian contingent and sailed for South Africa. There he was captured by the Boers, but he managed to escape and to rejoin the British ranks to fight till the war was concluded. It was on his return to Australia that Mr. Hutton began his newspaper career.

After serving on the staff of Australian newspapers he went to the United States, and there worked for many of the prominent newspapers. About 10 or 15 years ago he came to Canada and has since resided in Montreal and Toronto.

Mr. Sutor-Hutton is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Violet Whittaker, niece of W. Malcolm McKay, of Rothesay, N. B., and by two sisters, one in Australia and one in England. Mrs. C. F. Beard, of this city, left on Monday evening for Montreal, called by the death of Mr. Sutor-Hutton.

MONTCALM BRINGS OUT 41 FAMILIES

Five Are For Maritimes—Salvation Army and Catholic Groups

Forty-one families, totalling 208 souls, are among the passengers coming out from Liverpool on the Canadian Pacific steamer Montcalm, due here this week-end. These families are part of 3,000 families being brought out to this country to settle in the agricultural districts. Of the 41 families arriving this week, five, consisting of 24 persons, are destined for the Maritime Provinces. On this boat there are also a Salvation Army party of 88 souls and a Catholic Immigration Society party of 17. The Montcalm will have 163 first and 1,087 third class passengers.

The Canadian Pacific steamer Minnedosa sailed today at 1.30 o'clock for Chebourg and Southampton. She had on board 125 first and 130 third class passengers. A special train from Montreal arrived today, bringing 130 passengers for the boat.

MANY AT MASS FOR HOLY THURSDAY

Bishop Compliments People in Brief Address—Visiting Priests Here

A congregation that filled the Cathedral gathered this morning at 9 o'clock for the mass of Holy Thursday, celebrated by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, assisted by priests of the Cathedral and from other parishes who have come to the city for the special services of Holy Week. These services were begun last evening with a "Missa Solenne" in addition to the mass, there was the blessing of the oils to be used during the year. A deeply impressive feature was a procession to the repository in the Virgin's chapel.

Bishop LeBlanc spoke briefly, complimenting the people on the very large attendance at the mass on the anniversary of the institution of the Blessed Sacrament. Evidently they were keeping to the good resolutions made at the time of the mission. He urged all who could make visits to the repository in the Cathedral or the other parish churches. For this purpose the Cathedral will be open all night.

The priests here from other parishes for Holy Week include Rev. Dr. Guertin, St. Joseph's University, Rev. S. Oram of Riverside, Rev. W. H. Holland of St. George, and Rev. H. L. Coughlan of Loch Lomond.
