

BULLET FOUND IN BLACKBOARD

Shot Is Fired Into Manawagonish Road School House

Neighbors Say They Heard Shot in Afternoon—Investigation Being Made.

A bullet of .38-calibre was found lodged in the slate blackboard on the western side of the schoolhouse in the Manawagonish road yesterday morning and apparently had been fired through the eastern window.

When the scholars arrived for the morning session and the broken window and lodged bullet were discovered the secretary of the trustees, Alfred H. Clark, was called. Inquiries



which he made elicited the information that neighbors had heard a shot fired some time between 5 and 6 o'clock on the afternoon of the previous day.

It was said yesterday that the trustees were having the matter investigated. The direction taken by the investigation was that it had been fired by someone walking along the road and whether the shot was fired by accident or in sport it was considered a very serious matter to have the schoolhouse made the target since it might happen that the teacher or pupils were still in the building.

LAXITY CLAIMED

With the recent complaints of poisoned meats having been strewn in the fields around this district the firing of the shot has aggravated the feeling that there is too little respect for law and order in this locality, residents say.

During the last few weeks there have been seven or eight dogs poisoned and one or two cats. The latest victim was "Prince," the big Newfoundland dog which was formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Goodspeed and since they moved away has been owned by Mr. and Mrs. Colin Gilker. Prince was a general favorite with the children around Fairville and the Manawagonish road district and "ten came back to his favorite haunts of the former days.



Fine Crayon Study Sent to Museum

A crayon portrait study and a very nice china teapot both very fine examples of their own type of art but doubly valuable and interesting by reason of their associations have been presented to the Natural History Society as a loan for the museum collections by Mrs. M. H. B. Good. The portrait is signed Carlo Roberts, 1849, and shows a very charming young woman with the severe style of hairdressing and costume affected in 1849.

It is a portrait of Miss Adrienne Gordon, cousin of General Gordon, (Chinese Gordon). Miss Gordon was an intimate friend of Mrs. James Berrie, mother of the late Rev. John C. Berrie and grandmother of Mrs. M. H. Berrie Good.

Miss Gordon was a lady-in-waiting to the Empress Eugenie. The small Chinese teapot which Mrs. Good has

loaned to the society was brought from China to England by General Gordon on one of his earliest furloughs and was given by him to his cousin who afterwards willed it to Rev. J. C. Berrie, the son of her friend.




