Rev. Dr. MacKinnon Delivers Sermon in Honor of Saint's Day

TRIBUTE PAID TO SCOTTISH PEOPLE

Rev. Dr. Morison Speaks on Saint at St. Matthew's Service

The members of St. Andrew's Society met at 10:30 o'clock on their morning and headed by two pipers marched to St. David's church. There was a large turnout of the members, the largest for some years. The members of the society along with the president of St. George's Society, R. G. Schofield, occupied the front pews of the church which had been reserved for the society. Each member wore beside a badge a sprig of heather.

St. David's large choir rendered the beautiful anthem by Spohr—"As Pants the Hart." Mr. Blake Ferris singing the obligato. Also a mixed quartette, Mrs. Ferris, Miss Stevens, Mr. Case and Mr. McGowan, "Some Blessed Day." The large congregation joined heartily in old familiar psalms and hymns.

On the platform with Rev. Hugh Miller, chaplain of the society, were Rev. Clarence MacKinnon, D.D., principal of Pine Hill College Halifax, and Rev. David Lang, a former minister of St. Andrew's church, who read scripture lessons and pronounced the benediction.

HIS TEXT.

Rev. Dr. MacKinnon took for his text Isaiah 63:14: "So didst Thou lead Thy people, to make Thyself a glorious name." He gave some wonderful pictures of the debt Canada owes to the nations of the Old Land, particularly to the Scotch of the "Gleens and hills of Old Scotia" who left the old land years ago to settle in Canada.

The Scotch laid great importance on education and religion, he said, and "cannot we Canadians learn some lessons from the history of Scotland in its pride in education and religion?" he asked.

He paid a glowing tribute to the Scotch thrift. In closing he made an earnest appeal to the members of the society to go forward, believing that there is no home so humble, but ought to be touched with the Christian religion and that the school house should be placed in every hamlet.

The society on return to their rooms, passed a hearty vote of thanks to Dr. MacKinnon, Rev. Hugh Miller, session trustees and choir of St. David's church and also to the two pipers.

AT ST. MATTHEW'S

Last evening Rev. Dr. J. A. Morison, preaching in Saint Matthew's church before a large congregation spoke of the life and influence of Scotland's patron saint, Saint Andrew.

After reviewing all the references in holy writ to this Apostolic hero the doctor recited the interesting legends which cling about his name, and reminded his hearers that outside of Scripture there were many such legends. In the Apocryphal Acts of the Apostles edited by Tischendorf in the Acts of Andrew and Matthew they are told, he said, that Christ sent Saint Andrew to rescue Saint Matthew who was held a prisoner in the land of the Anthropophagi, where Saint Andrew was tortured. The legend told that Saint Matthew was released whereupon a flood overwhelmed the city and many conversions resulted. This legend occurred in the Ethiopian Syriac and in the Anglo Saxon and it was with the latter that as students of English literature were most concerned.

Dr. Morison then referred to the Exeter Book and the Versify Book with the pieces by Cynewulf about St. Hiden, the brother of Constantine and also a well known poem on the Pates of the Apostles. In the Miracula Andree Gregory of Tours spoke of the missionary labors in the land of the Anthropophagi, Sinope, Nicaea, Nicomedia, and Patraea in Achaia where his martyrdom took place.

The traditions of the martyrdom of this saint were fairly constant. It had been said that in the year 1210 Cardinal Peter of Capua brought his remains from Constantinople to Amalfi. They were brought from Patraea to Constantinople about 337 A. D. His cross of the decussate or saltire form was of late origin, for example in the 13th Century in the statue of Amiens he held the upright cross. It was also a tradition that Saint Regulus brought

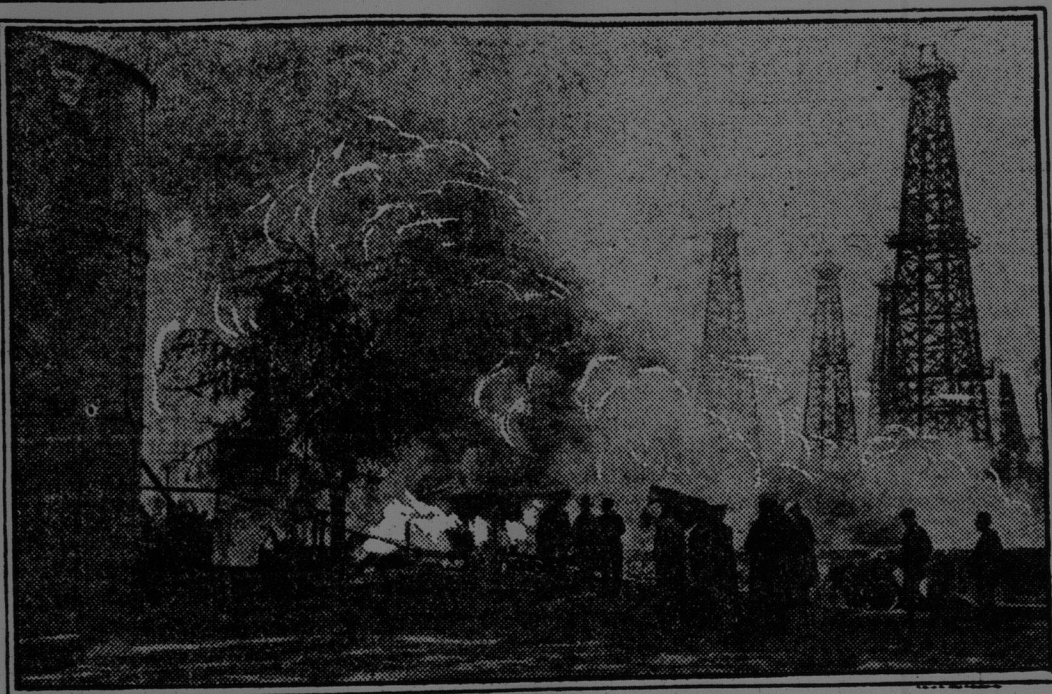

English Farmers Oppose Use of Good Land For Bombing

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Interest and opposition has been aroused in Lincolnshire by an Air Ministry scheme for the establishment in the Holbeach Marsh and Gedgey Marsh Districts, off the Wash, of a new range for aerial firing practice, including bombing.

About 400 acres of the best land in the district are to be acquired, and a danger zone (roughly a mile all around

the targets) created, in which no one will be allowed to enter. The land to be acquired is not to be cultivated, and on the ground that it would be a waste of good food-producing land, local landowners are opposing the scheme.

One farmer whose land is wanted has fixed the price at \$750 an acre. It is also understood that opposition will be forthcoming from the Holbeach Rural District Council, who have been written to by the Board of Trade.

MISSIONARY TO HOME

Gathering up the abiding lessons of his life Dr. Morison said that Saint Andrew was one of the first great apostolic missionaries to the home. He brought his own brother to the Master, and that was none less than Saint Peter and the church of the centuries told what that had meant for Christianity and the world. More than that Saint Andrew possessed a meek and humble spirit. He was more concerned in fidelity to the Master than in making for himself a great name in the religious world. He was abundantly willing to occupy a secondary place and position so long as the cause of the Master flourished. In all this he had proved himself a model worthy of thought and imitation by all who in every religious circle would endeavor to bring the world nearer to God.

He anticipated the words of Christ: "Give me the lowest place—Not that I dare ask for that lowest place—But thou shalt have it." He said: "Give me the lowest place—or if for me, that lowest place too high—make one more low."

Where I may sit and see, my God, and love thee so."

Paths Made by Cows Guide Road Builders

Does bovine intelligence contain engineering knowledge? Laymen may answer to the contrary, but professional users of the level, transit and chain stand ready to testify that cattle habits are of great aid in laying out roads of easy grade in mountainous areas which the cow has roamed at will, says the "Detroit News."

Myron C. Burr, Los Angeles civil engineer, who is going over the 50,000-acre tract in Tehachapi district which is being developed as the future home of the Pacific Coast Sportsmen's Club, said:

"It has frequently come to my attention in surveying rights of way on rough lands that the 'cow-path,' if made by normal passage of the cattle, never exceeds a 5 per cent grade. Especially is this true in the Pacific Coast Sportsmen's Club grounds which are of rugged nature and which have been ranged for years by bovine herds. In laying out the road plan, we shall follow the cattle trails almost exclusively."

Acrobat's Best Trick Not Appreciated

What an acrobat considers his most wonderful trick is often not appreciated by an audience seeking entertainment.

One of the greatest tricks from an acrobat's viewpoint consists in performing a double somersault in the air, jumping from the stage and landing on the feet without aid of a spring-board.

Few performers have succeeded in accomplishing this, and most of those who have done so have ceased to include it in their act because it does not draw sufficient applause.

On the other hand, one of the best liked tricks consists of balancing on top of piled-up tables and falling backward on the stage. This is considered one of the acrobat's simplest tricks.

Finds Champagne Half Century Old

Relics found beneath the cornerstone of the new demolished Murray Hill Baths at 113 West Forty-second street, New York, were withdrawn from the resting place which they have occupied for fifty years by Harry Marks, secretary of the corporation which is erecting a twenty-five-story office building for the Remington Typewriter Company on the former site of "The House of 10,000 Hungovers."

A bottle of fifty-year-old champagne was of more popular interest than the letter patent for a water lock signed by President Madison and James Monroe, then Secretary of state, dated March 21, 1814. Among other items were a cloisonne serving plate, some coins and paper notes of the late '40s and early '60s which included silver three-cent pieces and copper half cents, together with government notes for twenty-five and fifty cents.

30 Below Near Quebec City In Cold Wave

QUEBEC, Nov. 29.—Quebeckers received their first taste of cold weather today, the mercury dropping down to 8 below zero on the outskirts of the city, while in the city proper it was 2 below.

The mercury fell to 30 below at Lake Edward, about 30 miles from this city.

ZERO AT MONTREAL.
MONTREAL, Nov. 29.—Montreal experienced the most rigorous November cold wave in 34 years during the week-end. A cold blast from the northwest ushered in the winter weather and sent the thermometer down to zero, the lowest point for November since 1871.

Reports from suburban points report a temperature of 10 below zero.

Knighthood For Chamberlain, Rumor

LONDON, Nov. 30.—There is general expectation that a signal honor will be paid to Mr. Chamberlain to mark the success of the Locarno Conference.

It is rumored that he may be made a Knight of the Garter. This, the most ancient of the British Orders of Chivalry, was conferred a few months ago on the Earl of Oxford and Asquith, and is also worn by two other ex-Premiers, the Earl of Rosebery and the Earl of Balfour.

The conferment of the Order on a commoner has a precedent in the case of Viscount Grey; who received the Knighthood before he was elevated to the Peerage.

RUSSIAN MUSICIANS HERE ON MONTROSE

One Carries 'Cello Worth \$10,000 on Which Wonderful Repairs Made

Among the passengers who arrived here yesterday on the Canadian Pacific liner Montrose from Liverpool were three world famous musicians, Mischel, Leo and John Chermavsky, of Russia. This trip has been touring the world for the last 25 years, having started out as boys. They have played over 2,000 concerts, 500 of which were given in different parts of the Dominion when they were still in their teens. From here they proceeded to New York and, after a tour of the States, will go into Mexico. Mischel Chermavsky had with him his world-famous 'cello, which was made by Joseph Guernard, an Italian, in the year 1730.

Fine Repair Work.

On their recent return from a tour in South Africa this old instrument was smashed into pieces when a porter let it fall in front of a moving vehicle which passed over it. The pieces were collected and the finest workmen in England were engaged to repair it. Their efforts were so successful that it would be almost impossible to discern with the naked eye the many breaks and fractures. This 'cello is one of three still in existence and cost the owner \$10,000.

AUTO OVER PIER AND 4 OF FAMILY DROWN

Chaufeur Alone Saved as Car Dives Over Bulkhead in Brooklyn

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Four members of one family were drowned when a light touring car in which they were returning from a party in Brooklyn to their home in White Plains struck a bulkhead one foot high at Jay street, Brooklyn, and turned turtle as it dived into the water.

There were five persons in the car. The only one rescued was the chauffeur, Mike Gentile of White Plains. The curtains of the car were closed except the one next to the chauffeur's seat. He scrambled through it as the car settled upside down in the mud, and swam to the surface.

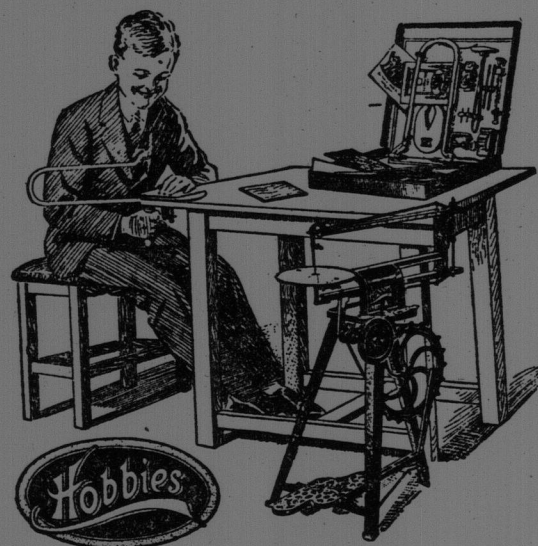
The four drowned were members of a family named Consolo. They were the father, about 55 years old; the mother, 50; a daughter, 22, and a son, 14.

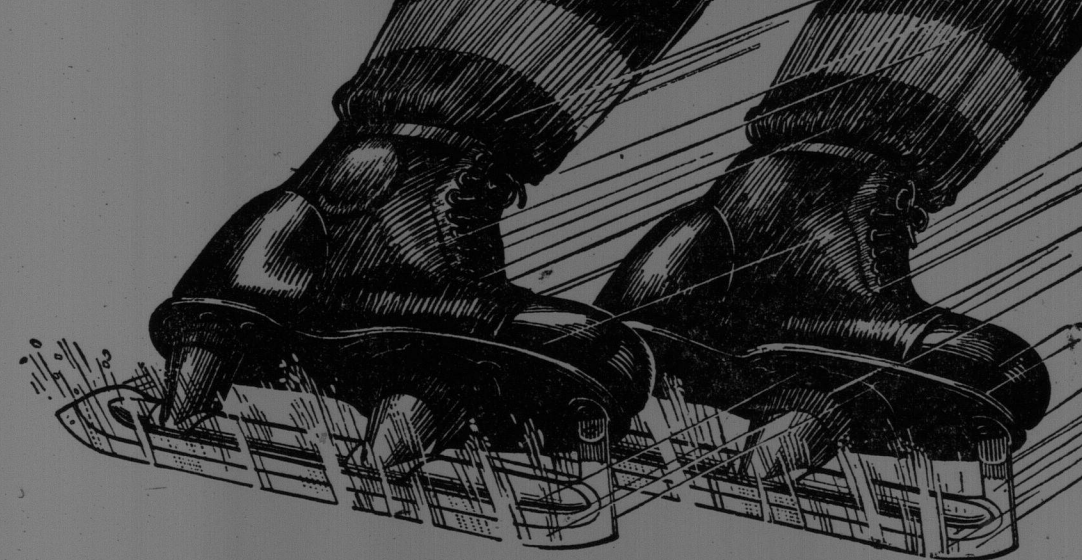

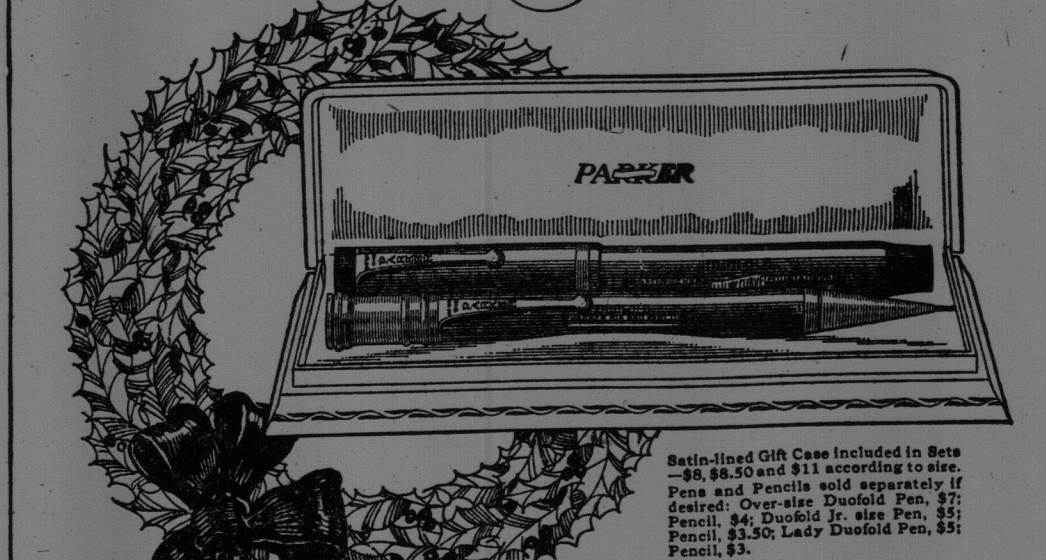
