Communists Campaign in All Towns and Villages, is Reported.

Moscow, Jan. 24.—An anti-religious campaign in towns and villages all over Russia has been inaugurated by the Communist party in connection with the reformation movement in the orthodox church, and the numerous trials of churchmen which are still going on in many districts.

"Religion darkens the mind," is the keynote of most of the speeches and anti-religious lectures. While unofficial support and official recognition of the various clerical groups who broke away from the former patriarch, Tikhon, has been afforded by the Soviet government, the Communist party expresses itself against any reforms in the church, which, it says, is trying to adopt Sovietism in order to live. It demands the entire liquidation of the church.

Anti-religious propaganda by lectures and otherwise is also being carried on among the Red army recruits in barracks.

The Times insists that "British policy must be clearly dissociated from the French policy of increased coercion."

Washington, Jan. 24—A note protesting against the French and Belgian attempt "to force with terrorizing measures German officials to render assistance in the execution of illegal measures aimed against their own country," through explusion of officials who refuse to co-operate with the forces of occupation in the Ruhr, was made public by the German embassy last night after it had been handed to the French, British and Belgian Governments by the German representatives at Paris, London and Brussels.

The embassy also made public another note sent yesterday to those governments and to Italy, defining the German position as to the ordinances issued by the inter-allied Rhineland commission covering the occupation which, it contends, "are in contradiction with the Rhineland convention," and have no legal value and are not to be complied with, by the local German officials.

Moscow is Watching.

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Moscow, Jan. 24—Reports from Germany indicating mobilizing of Polish troops along the German frontier have been received here. The government has adopted a policy, of watchful waiting. It is understood that Russia is taking all measures necessary to guard her Pollsh frontier against attack.

Munester, Jan. 24—Recent erroneous reports that the German army was being enlarged caused "hundreds, probably thousands," of laborers to quit their work and come here to enlist in the Retchswehr, says an official statement issued here.
