HOCKEY PLAYER IS DIVORCED

Cleghorn's Wife Given a Decree and \$100 a Month Alimony in New York.

Toronto, July 29.—A special to the Globe from New York says:—

A chance visit of Mrs. Evelyn Cleghorn to Ottawa last fall not only revealed to her news of her missing husband, Henry Wm. Sprague Cleghorn, one of the best known hockey players in the country, but disclosed information that there was another woman whom he introduced as his wife.

Supreme Court Justice Cobham today granted a divorce decree to Mrs. Cleghorn and directed her former husband to pay her \$100 a month alimony, a year as the representative of a sporting goods house in Ottawa. Her witnesses were residents of Ottawa, who testified in depositions that Mrs. Vivian Dalboe, named in the complaint as co-respondent, was introduced to them as Mrs. Cleghorn.

The Cleghorns were married here at the Little Church Around the Corner on May 4, 1911.
