Certainly the public play ground is a splendid institution in congested cities, but here in Fairville, a few steps will bring the children to green fields and shady trees. What better play ground could be wanted?

If there is money to spend, let us start first in doing a little towards cleaning up our streets, banishing the dust nuisance, and making of Fairville a clean, tidy community, instead of being the dirty, unkempt town, for which it is now famous.
