EVIDENCE HEARD AT POLICE INQUIRY LAST EVENING

Seven witnesses were heard in the police investigation last evening. Sergeant Hastings amongst other things, admitted having done work for the chief one day, but said he had received no pay for it, nor did not expect it.

Policeman John Merrick, on the force since 1891, was asked concerning the circumstances of the arrest of a boy named White for setting a bottle some little time ago, and said that the lad had been placed in a cell with a man who had been drunk. He had been kept there about an hour, Merrick said he had heard that the same evening a man had left the station in a coach, after having been arrested for drunkenness.

Sergeant John Smith, who joined the force more than thirty years ago, said he had been acting sergeant for twenty years, and two of his juniors by nearly seventeen years, Finley and Scott had been appointed sergeants over his head. He had been suspended once for two days because he had assisted to his home ex-Policeman Bowes who was drunk while on his holidays.

Sergeant Joseph Scott, when asked his opinion in regard to the force, said that "on the whole they were a good crowd of men." He said he had heard that Campbell, Silas Perry and Briggs were particularly anxious to make arrests. Commissioner McLellan asked Policeman James Ross if he thought he was over-anxious in his enforcement of the traffic laws, and the witness said "no." He said he had ordered the commissioner while driving in an automobile in Charlotte street after midnight one night to keep to the left, rather than to violate the laws by running in the centre of the road. Mr. McLellan warned him to use discretion in enforcing the traffic laws.

George Totton, policeman since 1899, denied having received anything from Perry the night of the Brayley Drug Co. break, saying that although he had a parcel under his arm going home, it was his cardigan jacket.

Deputy Chief Jenkins recalled, said that after the theft of tobacco from the Imperial Tobacco Co. Mr. Bryden, the manager, had told him he suspected Mr. Richards, the advertising manager, and consequently he went to the latter's home to search it. Bryden had not said he suspected the police.

WANTS A NIGHT FERRY

The Editor of the Times.
Sir,—The winter port season will very soon be round again, and I should be glad of an opportunity to express through the medium of your paper, a sentiment which I have frequently heard from many winter port workers: "There should be a night ferry service." The question of whether it would bring business to the city's exchequer should, I think, be a secondary consideration, providing it pays expenses in the latter's hands.

At least fifty per cent. of the workers live in the city as a rule; supposing then, work is stopped on account of weather, or any other reason after twelve o'clock at night; which is often the case, the unfortunate workman must either walk around the bridge—a very uninviting prospect to a tired man whatever the weather be like—or find some place to sleep for the few hours he is off (a difficult matter at that time of night). The mere insertion of a solitary letter will not do much, but if some one in authority would step forward and use his influence in pushing this matter, I know he would earn the gratitude of many a "longshoreman" this winter and also insure a few "steady gangs" for the boats.

TORONTO HOUSING COMPANY

Relieve Pressure of Demand For The Small Houses

One million dollars is needed by the Toronto Housing Company to complete the development of its land in and near the city of Toronto. Already the company is co-operating with the city in so far as it operates within the city limits, but a plan of finance for the suburban undertaking is one of the tasks ahead of the company, in the first annual report of the company read by President G. Frank Beer last week, at a meeting of the directors.

It is not, said Mr. Beer, "our object now to financially assist the city in its efforts to meet the existing demand for small houses. The most we can do is to relieve the pressure at a point where it will be most felt. We hope, too, that private enterprise will adopt some of the ideas we are endeavoring to realize in our forms of development. This has been the experience in other countries where housing companies such as ours have been in operation. Our company being conducted upon strictly business principles, private enterprise is not prevented from finding profitable investment upon similar lines. Rather, we indicate a way which, in our judgment, is safe and attractive.

"We recognize the necessity to conduct our business upon strict business principles. The rentals payable in advance are estimated to cover cost of up-keep, taxes, insurance, interest on bonds, interest on shareholders' capital, and to provide a sinking fund to retire all the bonds in forty years. The whole of this rental is collected in eleven months of the year. A proportionate rental for the twelfth month is also collected, but this is rebated to our tenants if upon examination of their premises it is found that everything has been kept in good repair. The amount of the rebate is conditional upon the cost to the company of internal repairs. Exterior up-keep is included in the rental collected within the eleven months."

GARDEN SUBURBS TO SOLVE THE HOUSING PROBLEM

Hon. George H. Murray Thinks Montreal Has a Big Problem Before It

Montreal, Oct. 29.—The Hon. George H. Murray, premier of Nova Scotia when here on the way to attend the conference of provincial premiers in Ottawa mentioned that while in the city he had noted with interest that one of the chief topics of conversation amongst prominent men was the housing problem as it applied to Montreal—more especially to the working classes. He hoped that some of the reports he had heard from the newspapers were exaggerated, otherwise Montreal had indeed a big problem at its doors. Mr. Murray referred to a movement that was now gaining ground in various parts of Nova Scotia for the forming of garden suburbs on the co-partnership principle—following the pattern set by the Hampstead Tenant Societies in London, England, and which seemed likely to mature.

Provincial Demands

At the gathering of the provincial premiers in Ottawa yesterday a request was made for ten per cent. of the revenue from customs and excise of all Canada. The conference also demanded increased pay for lieutenant governors and a change in the title to "governor." Each of the lieutenant governors now receives from \$7,000 to \$10,000 a year. In presenting the claim for sharing in the revenue, the provincial representatives said that the present provincial allowances are insufficient. The various resolutions were presented to Premier Borden who promised consideration.

Plans for electrifying all railroads in the vicinity of St. Petersburg by harnessing the falls of a river contemplate transmitting the current at 400,000 volts, the heaviest voltage ever attempted.

A monument will be erected by public subscription to the memory of Schiaparelli, a distinguished astronomer, at his birthplace in Italy.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

A marked decrease is shown in the earnings of U. S. Steel in the report of the U. S. Steel Corporation for the third quarter of the year, compared with the corresponding period last year. The surplus for the last quarter is about \$4,500,000 below previous one.

Hans Schmidt, former priest in prison charged with murder in New York, said yesterday that he was alone responsible for the murder of Anna Ammuller and the counterfeiting with which an effort is being made to connect Dr. Ernest Muret.

Edward M. Sherwood, station master at Hillsboro, has been appointed manager of the Seaboard and Albert railroad, in place of his father, who is now with the Fredericton-Minto road. T. H. Barnett of Albert has been appointed station agent at Hillsboro.

At the November sitting of the Gagetown county court at Gagetown yesterday Judge Wilson presided. The only business before the court was that of the King vs. James Gibson, who was charged with rape and theft from his employer. The grand jury brought in a true bill against the prisoner, but as the county court has no jurisdiction in such a serious matter, the prisoner was remanded to jail to appear before the

supreme court at their next sitting. Percy A. Guthrie appeared for Gibson and E. C. Weyman of St. John, prosecuted.

Washington, Oct. 28.—Three European nations, Great Britain, Germany and France, have agreed to adopt no new policy toward Mexico until the government of the United States can submit for their consideration a definite plan for the future treatment of the revolution-torn republic in Central America.

Montreal, Oct. 28.—Chief of Police Campeau has served a writ on John H. Roberts, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, claiming \$300 as nominal damages for alleged defamation of character.

Dr. Ernest Muret, a friend of Hans Schmidt, confessed slayer of Anna Ammuller, who has been on trial in the federal court for counterfeiting, was found guilty yesterday. On two counts of making and possessing counterfeiting apparatus, Muret was held to be guilty, but the jury decided that he was not guilty of conspiracy with Schmidt to counterfeiting United States' gold certificates.

Within less than a year two San Francisco clergymen have resigned their pulpits to enter a more lucrative field, and, strange to say, in both cases the undertaking business has been the one selected.
