NEW YORK'S NEW OPERA HOUSE OPENED
NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The Manhattan Opera House, New York's newest theatre, was dedicated to grand opera to-night when Bellini's "I Puritani" was presented. The audience was one of the largest and showiest that ever gathered at a first night in this city. In opening his handsome house Oscar Hammerstein introduced to America several noted singers, including Alessandro Bonoli, an Italian tenor, who has been heralded as the equal of his famous countryman Caruso. Others in the cast were Mlle. Pinkert, Mlle. Zaccaria, M. Venturini, M. Ancona, M. Arimondi and M. Mugnos. There were no vacant seats and but few boxes were unoccupied when Cleofante Campanini, leader of the orchestra of 75 pieces, waved his baton and the musicians struck up "The Star Spangled Banner." The entire audience arose, applauding and cheering when the anthem was finished.

CHATHAM HAS TROUBLE OVER NEW BOILERS
CHATHAM, N. B., Dec. 4.—At last night's meeting of the town council it transpired that the Canada Foundry Co. of Montreal, who have contracted for three boilers for the electric light station, will pay no heed to the town's communication relative to their shipment. Over three weeks ago the company sent word that the boilers were ready for shipment. All their communications were honored. Several aldermen were very indignant last night and some wanted the contract taken away from the Canada Foundry Co. The firm was to have the boilers here, and everything was to be in working order for the Christmas season, but now owing to the protracted delay this is not possible. It was felt that little or nothing could be done present, but the company will be notified that the town will hold them responsible for all damages caused by their delay, as the contract terms expired some weeks ago. Smelt fishing has begun on the river. Several fishermen landed over a ton in last night's operations.

MRS. MAYBRICK AND HER MOTHER IN COURT
Suing a Real Estate Dealer for Value of Lands Fraudulently Sold by Him

RICHMOND, Va., Dec. 2.—The case of Baroness Von Rogues against W. D. Armstrong and others to recover the proceeds of the sale of large tracts of land in Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky, was heard in the chancery court here today.

Mrs. Maybrick, who served ten years in an English prison for the alleged murder of her husband, sat in court beside her mother, the complainant in the case.

Counsel for complainant contended that in the late eighties the defendant had engaged to represent the Baroness Von Rogues and Mrs. Maybrick in the matter of large land holdings, and that he disposed of certain lands in Virginia to a Kentucky concern represented here, afterward making overtures to the defendant to buy from her the properties for \$100,000. This, counsel alleged, was done, and afterwards the defendant it is said, secured a deed "pages" for the property. The business and her daughter claim that the sale was made before the defendant secured the property from them and they are suing for the difference between what they got and what was secured by the defendant.

The suit has been in court a number of years.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
