

In 1907 an act was passed by the provincial government making it obligatory upon the part of the city to make the cost of sewerage maintenance ance a charge upon the water assessment. This it was thought would relieve for all time the much-vexed problem of sewerage maintenance deficits pressing at that time. The water maintenance had shown a surplus for some years and it was thought that the combination of the two utilities in the one assessment would balance up the accounts. The surplus of the water maintenance offsetting the deficit of severage maintenance. In practice, however, chiefly owing to unforeseen expenditure the scheme has been a failure. The rates have been considerably raised, owing to enormous and unexpected reconstruction works demanding immediate attention and a general mutiny against its continuance has followed in natural sequence.
