

forming the procession submitted without any resistance, and marched away.

Some after several repetitions of the municipal cavalry arrived, and the populace was desired to disperse. This order being disregarded, the charge was renewed, and the populace fled on the people.

Each company of infantry carried, besides their usual arms, a collection of implements for cutting down barricades, such as hatchets, pickaxes, adzes, &c. These were tied upon the knapsack, each soldier carrying one.

At the meeting of the Chambers at one o'clock the greatest calm prevailed. Few deputies were present, and the benches of the Opposition were completely vacant.

A very stormy conversation took place at the Chamber of Peers on the present state of Paris, but the President refused to receive any of the members.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.  
IMPEACHMENT OF LORD PALMERSTON.  
Mr. ASHLEY brought forward his motion relative to the foreign policy of the country for the last twelve years, stating that it was his intention to found thereon a motion for the impeachment of Lord Palmerston, whom he denounced in almost in so many words, as a hired tool of Russia, a traitor, a liar, a subverter of the press; in short, everything vile and base, both as a Minister and a man.

Mr. URQUHART seconded the motion. Mr. SHELTON said that for years past the Hon. Member for Stafford (Mr. Urquhart) had endeavored to fix the charge of treason upon Lord Palmerston, and the attack was now really made by him from the ambush of the hon. member for Youghal. The speech of the latter, he observed, was more a subject of the commiseration than of the indignation of the House.

Mr. URQUHART then appealed to admit that if both he and his friend were wrong, they must be madmen, and he wished to God that, in this matter he could be proved an enthusiast and a madman. (Great laughter.)

Abdication of Louis Philippe.  
Louis Philippe has abdicated. The Count de Paris is King. The Duke of Nemours, As Regent, is charged with the Government until the meeting of the National Assembly.

General Anselmi de la Concha had been appointed Ambassador to Paris.

SICILY.—A letter from Palermo, bearing date February 4th, says as follows:—The evacuation of Palermo by the Neapolitan troops looks more like a flight than a retreat.

There has been a frightful loss of life, and in the evacuation the troops have refused to march. The passengers from Palermo to Messina were obliged to return from Neuchâtel to Palermo, the railway being stopped.

It is said, however, that the Government have received telegraphic communications with respect to the combined power of the various intelligences, and that they will be equally difficult for this cause to endure with patience or to resist with success.

STATE OF EUROPE.—POSTING OF EMERALD.—A vessel that had been lying at anchor in the harbor of Palermo, and which was supposed to contain a large quantity of arms, was seized by the authorities.

THE BRITISH AND NORTH AMERICAN ROYAL MAIL.—The British and North American Royal Mail Steamship Company, in conformity with the provisions of the Act, have made twenty voyages to and from Palermo and Naples, the distance between Palermo and Naples being 110 miles.

SPAIN.—The Government have recently appointed a Frenchman to the post of ambassador in Madrid. The name of the ambassador is M. de Lamoignon.

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ROMANESQUE.—On Monday night, the Countess of St. John, Mrs. Hamilton, Earl of Peterborough, was entertained by some persons, who, while the dinner and dancing, making all the money they could find, and ransacking the papers.
