

PROGRAMME FOR OLD HOME WEEK COMES TO END TODAY

Milledgeville will be Centre of Attraction for Visitors this Afternoon, with Water Sports and Dance--Automobile Parade Feature of Yesterday.

With a continuation of the fine weather which has been a feature of Old Home Week, today should prove the most successful of the week. This afternoon being the regular Saturday half holiday, a number of attractions will be held.

On the Marathon grounds Houlton and the Marathons will meet at 2 o'clock, when a good game is looked for. The Cambridge City Band will be heard in a special concert in St. Andrew's Park, and the theatre will be in full swing. The principal feature of today's programme, however, will likely be the sports at Milledgeville. An exceptionally good programme of water sports have been arranged, and a big day's sport is looked for.

Yesterday's Visitors.

So far as the number of people coming to town is concerned the Old Home Week celebration seems to have been considerable of a success. Up to five o'clock yesterday afternoon about 4,000 people had called at the Board of Trade rooms and registered their names, and it is not likely that this represents more than a portion of the total number of visitors to the city during the week. A glance at the addresses given by the visitors to the Board of Trade rooms indicates that the Back to New Brunswick for a Week scheme has been widely advertised and shows that former citizens of St. John are scattered pretty liberally over the face of the continent. There were parties from Texas, California, Dakota, Virginia, Florida, New York, and many other places in the United States. Not a few people registered from Upper Canada, the prairie provinces and even from British Columbia. A large number of visitors registered from Maine and the New England states, and the sister province of Nova Scotia sent a fair quota of exiles back home.

Many of the visitors had not been in St. John for half a lifetime, and these were greatly impressed with the progress of the city and its general aspect of business prosperity. Some of the visitors confessed that they had not made a very great success of life in the places of their adoption and admitted that if they had stopped home they would have been as well if not better off than they are now. C. P. R. Proposes to Build New Lines

Engineers Arrive in Fredericton and Commence Survey Work -- Branch From Marysville to Gibson and Minto Line.

Fredericton, July 12.—An engineering party of ten members under the direction of Chas. Garden, formerly of Woodstock, as chief engineer, arrived in the city at noon yesterday. Their arrival caused some excitement because of the lack of information obtainable as to the work they were to undertake.

Mr. Garden was very non-committal, declining to give out any information whatever, and all the other members of the party would say that they were in the employ of the C. P. R. and came here from Peterborough, Ont., on two hours' notice and under sealed orders. At St. John Mr. William Downie, the general superintendent of the Atlantic division of the C. P. R., disclaimed all knowledge as to the work the party would do; in fact, he didn't know anything about them, he said.

Finally, however, it was said that the party were here to make a survey of the proposed line of railway from Marysville to a point on the Gibson and Minto railway, thus putting the Nashwan town in direct communication with the Grand Lake coal fields, and at the same time giving the C. P. R., which will operate the Gibson and Minto railway, access to the Marysville coal fields.

More important work.

However, Engineer Garden and his party of men were not brought all the way from Ontario to make a survey for a branch line three miles in length and it is believed that their mission is of far greater importance.

Unless well-versed in railway matters, surveys will be made by the party, as soon as the survey to Marysville is completed, for the link to the Gibson and Minto Railway, thus putting the Nashwan town in direct communication with the Grand Lake coal fields, and at the same time giving the C. P. R., which will operate the Gibson and Minto railway, access to the Marysville coal fields.

That such a link would be constructed and the C. P. R. have such a line to Halifax was forethoughted by The Gleaner some time ago, and it is now believed that the preliminary arrangements are being made to have the work undertaken within a comparatively short time. The belief that the work is to start soon has been strengthened by the fact that on his last visit to the city Mr. D. McNichol, the vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., made a careful inspection of the present railway bridge and looked into the feasibility of strengthening the present structure or building a new one to handle the heavy traffic which would have to be carried by a trunk line.

It is understood that there are two alternative plans to be looked into. One is the construction of a line from Harvey to Fredericton, and thence across the river to Gibson to connect with the Gibson and Minto Railway, while the other is to construct a line from Harvey to Burden or Prince William on the St. John Valley Railway, a distance of about eleven miles, and via the Valley to Fredericton, to connect with the Gibson and Minto line. The former proposition is understood to be that viewed most favorably, but the matter which is adopted, it means that Fredericton will be on the C. P. R.'s through line and is soon to be a notable railway centre.

RAIN FAILED TO DAMPEN SPIRITS OF THE ORANGEMEN

Ten Thousand Parade in Winnipeg Despite Inclement Weather--Every Man Dripping but Ranks Not Broken.

Winnipeg, Man., July 12.—Ten thousand Orangemen banded with the purple and gold paraded through the city this morning in celebration of the memorable twelfth. There were 6,000 members of the city orders and 4,000 from outside lodges. A sudden drenching downpour broke over the procession just as it was passing through the centre of the city. Every man of the ten thousand in the procession was soaked but the line never broke, and dripping water, the Orangemen marched right on, despite the fact that they had a three mile parade to the park ahead of them. Heavy showers tended to spoil the picnic at Assiniboine Park, but nothing could dampen the enthusiasm.

ROYALISTS ARE STOPPED ON WAY TO JOIN COMRADES

Forty Seeking Entrance to Portugal Turned Back on Frontier--Leader Prepares to Stand Siege.

Madrid, July 12.—Press despatches from the frontier say that Captain Couceiro, the Royalist leader, with 700 men, is now at Valencia, the garrison of which place is preparing to receive an attack. The governor of Caceres sent word that he has stopped a band of 40 Portuguese royalists who were about to cross the frontier, among them being several who are believed to be prominent leaders.

Lisbon, July 12.—A band of mounted monarchists composed of Lisbon society youth appeared today at Carqueira, about 12 miles from Lisbon, and attempted to provoke a rising. A detachment of troops with artillery were despatched in pursuit of the monarchists.

THIRTEEN CASES OF BUBONIC PLAGUE IN TRINIDAD LATELY

Port of Spain, Trinidad, July 12.—There has been a total of thirteen cases of bubonic plague in the island of Trinidad since March 29, when the first case appeared this year. Of that number nine persons died, two recovered and two are now convalescing in the hospital. Six of the thirteen cases were outside the town of Port of Spain.

The sanitary authorities recognizing the necessity of taking precautionary measures to prevent the spread of the disease continue actively to destroy rats and are making every endeavor to control the outbreak.
