THE VIEW OF AN OUTSIDER REGARDING P. E. ISLAND

A Former Resident of the Island tells of his Impressions on a Recent Trip Back Home after a Prolonged Absence—
The Fox Business Reviewed.

The following was taken from the Eastern Farm and Home: Well, the people of Prince Edward Island are certainly enthusiastic in regard to the silver black fox industry. I had the privilege of spending several days on the island garden recently and I am frank to say it was time well spent—well spent from various standpoints. On the mainland, in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, many people are interested in silver black foxes. Some to a moderate extent and some to a greater extent. In Prince Edward Island the interest is intense. Everyone talks about foxes and the mere mention of the fact that one is really and truly interested in the great industry is an open passport to consideration and attention.

What a change the fox business has wrought in the island. Years ago, when I was a boy—please do not ask me how many years ago—Prince Edward Island was the land of potatoes, oats and horses. Now it is the land of black foxes. That is, the island has been called the Garden of the Gulf and it is certainly well named. At the time of the writer's visit, about a fortnight ago, the crops of hay and grain certainly looked splendid, certainly much better than the crops on the mainland, where in general the yield will be far below the average. As a rule the railway seems to go through the worst part of the country, through barren wildernesses and rocky deserts. It is quite different on the island. The builders of the P. E. I. Railway may have looked for the barren places and perhaps that accounts for the crookedness of those island rails, but evidently they had very good reasons for it. For poor land for the reason that there is no poor land on the island. I may be stretching the truth here but I can honestly say that though I have travelled quite extensively on Prince Edward Island yet I have still to find a spot that is anything suggestive of poor land. And those fox ranches, some of them, at least, are located right in the beauty spots of the beautiful garden. No wonder the island people are proud of their island home. They have reason to be. But then while the island seems to have few if any faults I have frank to say that the island people have enough to make the people and before I am done I may say several very complimentary things, enough to offset the criticisms anyway. First I will say a good word. The island and people are very hospitable and kind—especially the hotel people. It is their business of course and they make you pay for it well but nevertheless they are hospitable to a marked degree. As a rule the island people are chatty and are ready to talk to you and give you whatever information you want. They do not stand on their dignity but are ready to meet you more than half way on the platform of sociability.

But then the island people are not yet educated to the automobile and in this they are laboring under a very serious handicap. Thousands upon thousands of dollars that now go elsewhere would be spent on the islands where motor cars allowed to run at will. Gradually, of course, the people are coming to the auto idea. They will have to that is all, but at the present time a man with a car either in Summerside or Charlottetown is about as happy as a boy with a new pair of pants who is forbidden to put them on. True, autos may run on certain days in both the towns named but then it is barely possible that a man might want to go somewhere on one of the forbidden days and then he would be up against it, so to speak. When a man is confronted with a prohibition he straightway wants to do the forbidden thing and I would bet money that the man who owns a car in P. E. I. wants to go out the worst sort of way on the forbidden days. Summerside has been described as a one Automobile town but Charlottetown seems to have a lot of them, probably forty or fifty. The day will come soon—it can't come too soon—when the prohibition against cars will be removed. Then there will be something doing on the island. Then there will be a call for better roads. Summer tourists will come in greater numbers. Motor car repair shops will spring up. More gasoline will be sold and so on. It would be a rich treat to motor from one end of the island to the other. I wonder when it will be allowed?

Both Summerside and Charlottetown are very prettily situated. Both are on the shore; both have plenty of trees and parks; both have comfortable homes and pleasing residences. In Charlottetown, on some streets at least they have not pulled down their high board fences. Frequently one sees a high board fence separating one neighbor from another. Then very often fences mar the landscape in front of the houses. If these fences were torn away and a bon fire made of them the town would certainly be greatly improved.

But to return to the fox industry. One may talk about different things on the island but sooner or later one returns to the discussion of foxes—all kinds, black, patch, cross, pedigree, western, Alaska, Ontario and in the language of the auction poster, others too numerous to mention. Dividends, of course, come in for a large share of attention. A man may be sceptical about the fox business, but when he meets a man who in a few years has made say fifty thousand dollars with a capital of a few hundred to start with, well it begins to get in ones blood and no mistake. You may call it speculation, you may call it a gamble, but nevertheless, one is drawn to the fox business pretty strongly and the fact that few if any have lost any money in the industry, makes one feel that there is a lot more than a gamble in the fox industry. Wisecracks may scoff at the foxes but the same man will probably advise you to take stock in a solid industry, full of water, which lasts for

a few years and goes to financial ruin. In many industries the only possible profit that is open to you are dividends of say seven per cent. In the fox business you have a chance to make big dividends and make them quick.

One thing is impressing itself upon the fox men of the island, viz., the necessity of interesting outside capital in the fox and fur farming industry. A large part of the available in silver black foxes; if the industry is to grow and develop more money must come from the outside. With this idea in mind efforts are being made to get in touch with the people of the United States and other countries. It is most gratifying to know

that these attempts have been crowned with success. Every day sees more capital rolling towards the island province; every day sees an increase in the number of converts to the great industry. Hardly a day passes but some man, hitherto skeptical, joins the band of fox enthusiasts and invests his capital in some ranch. To the islander the future looks bright with promise. His island home is the centre of the great industry, which he is confident will prove to be a permanent business.

Well, may his fondest hopes be realized. Here's to the fur farming business, the most fascinating, the most wonderful, the most lucrative in the world.

2nd.—As to promoters: Have every company fill a statement under oath showing number and kind of foxes bought and from whom bought. License every man who wishes to sell stock in fox companies on the island.

3rd.—As to all others who buy, sell or trade in foxes or shares of stock. Compel the issuance of a license and the return under oath of a description of all foxes handled with name of seller and buyer.

4th.—As to health and valuation. Employ a competent veterinary and an expert fur man.

M. I. Bolger of Charlottetown has some good suggestions for the betterment of the fox industry and in a letter to the Charlottetown Guardian recently he outlined his ideas. Among other things he suggested that if the following were enacted in a law they would go a long way towards bringing about the desired effect.

1st.—As to Ranches: In addition to present regulations have every ranchman make a return under oath giving number, color and age of every fox in ranch. What litters were born and what kind of pups in litter. List of foxes bought and sold and who the seller or buyer was. If foxes were lost and how. If disease appears notify a government veterinary who will immediately investigate.
