

WOOLSTOCK WELCOMES D. COMPANY OF 104th

FINE RECEPTION FOR 104th SOLDIERS WHO ARE TO BE QUARTERED AT WOODSTOCK

Two Hundred and Eighty-three of Col. Fowler's Men Arrived Saturday and Hospitality of Town Extended Them — Woodstock Man who Fought with the Princess' Pats at Mons Returns Home.

Woodstock, N. B., Nov. 28.—At 10.30 on Saturday night a crowd gathered at the C. P. R. station to welcome the 104th Battalion. The first of our wounded soldiers to reach home. He was taken by auto to his hotel and many visitors called during the evening and Sunday. Mr. Sutton left here with the first Canadian contingent and upon his arrival in England, having had 20 years training in the English army before coming to Woodstock, he was immediately drafted to the Princess Pats regiment and fought at Mons, as well as in other battles. He was wounded with German gas at Ypres. He has been suffering much from the action of gas on his lungs and will probably not be able to return to the firing line. Major Sutton welcomed the young hero, and afterwards he was the guest of Mayor Sutton, A. D. Holyoke, Jos. W. Gallagher, Colonel Dibblee, E. W. Jarvis and T. C. L. Ketchum for an auto drive around town and to his hotel.

MAJ. DEROSIER TO COMMAND NEW REGIMENT

Will return from front — Oliver Asselin, who will raise the Battalion, will be second in command.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—General Sir Sam Hughes states that Major Henry Derosier will be the commanding officer of the New French Canadian regiment which Oliver Asselin, the well known Nationalist, has been authorized to raise. Major Derosier is now at the front with the 14th Battalion, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the Royal Canadian Engineers, and he has been doing splendid work. He will return to Canada shortly to take up his new duties. Mr. Asselin will be second in command. General Hughes mentions that the regiment does not conflict with his political views, the Nationalist leader taking the ground that participation in this war on the side of the Allies is a service to mankind. Mr. Asselin served eleven months in the American army during the Spanish American war.

N. B. SOLDIER WINS HONOR IN ENGLAND

Serg't Darcy McGrath makes record marks in Exams at Canadian Military School in England.

London, Nov. 27.—Col. Matland, of the Royal Naval Air Service, jumped with a parachute today from an aeroplane which was 1,500 feet in the air. He landed safely. Col. Matland has been experimenting with projected developments of the aerial service and arrived at the point where it was necessary to determine whether an airman could land safely by parachute from such a height. "Some one has to do it," he said. "There is only one person I care to ask. I will make the attempt myself." It took the colonel fifteen minutes to make the descent, but he solved his problem satisfactorily.

DARING FEAT OF BRITISH AVIATOR

Jumped from Parachute of Aeroplane 1,500 feet in the air to prove feasibility of experiment.

Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—The Ottawa Bureau of the Western Associated Press gave out tonight a statement that the order of seizure of numbers 1, 2 and 3 wheat by the Dominion government does not extend to the western provinces, but applies only to the terminal elevators at the head of the lakes and in eastern Canadian elevators.

Berlin, via Sayville, Nov. 27.—The Serb prisoners in German, Austrian and Bulgarian hands now number 101,000 headquarters reports to the war office announced today. Dynamiting by the Serbs of the blast furnaces, shops and workmen's homes belonging to a French copper mining company at Zajecar, the flooding of the mine and the disappearance of the concerns Bulgarian manager are reported in the statement. Destruction of the works is said to have been ordered by Col. Maric, Serb commander of the district. With the Teutonic conquest of the Black Birds' plain, 2,000 Germans and Austrians whom the Serbs had captured were released, the Serbs abandoning them in their flight, the statement said. Capture of Pristina and Mitrovitza gave the invaders possession of the last section of the Uskub-Mitrovitza railroad.

Turk Report of Fighting in the Dardanelles.

Amsterdam, Nov. 27.—The following Turkish official statement regarding operations at the Dardanelles has been received here:

"On Thursday and Friday there was artillery and bomb fighting. Near Anafarta our artillery silenced the enemy artillery and dispersed by effective fire enemy troops and transport columns in the southern portion of Kamikilliman.

Cuba wants seed potatoes. During the months of October and November, Cuba buys from 600,000 to 800,000 barrels of seed potatoes. All potatoes used for seed in Cuba are imported from the north, and the farther north these potatoes are grown the better results are obtained here.

The variety of potatoes planted in Cuba is the "Early Rose." A small quantity of "Bliss Triumph" are also planted here. To sell at best advantage this stock must be pure. Pure "Early Rose" for seed is selling at 1. E. Havana today at \$4.00 per barrel, while "Early Rose" mixed with other varieties are selling at from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per barrel.

While prices are unusually high the present year, Cuba prices for pure seed potatoes are sufficiently high year after year to make it a profitable business for the New Brunswick farmers to produce these varieties of potatoes to supply this market.
