ROTHESAY STUDENTS ATTENDED DIVINE WORSHIP YESTERDAY

Large Congregation Listen To Able Sermon By Rev. H. E. Dibblee of Amherst, Who Has Son Overseas.

The students of Rothersey College attended divine service in St. Paul's church, Rothersey, yesterday, a large congregation being present. The sermon was preached by the Rev. H. E. Dibblee of Amherst, who has a son overseas, a former pupil at Rothersey School.

The text of the forceful inspiring sermon was taken from Psalm 18, verse 19. He brought me forth also in a large place. The preacher told the story of David and pointed out how this incident is related twice over as if the once telling of such a masterpiece were not enough. Fifty verses of this Psalm are repeated in Second Samuel—the story of the sweetest songs in all sacred poetry telling how the composer, himself a king, forgot his kingship, only remembering how he had been helped by the goodness of God to get up from a small place of struggle and defeat to a large place of opportunity and service.

This was compared to the paramount factor in the educational achievement of the Rothersey Collegiate School. Its system was to get boys up from a small place to a large place as true education always means leading forth and guiding forward out of a small place of ignorance and darkness into a large place of knowledge.

The service of College Sundays rounds off the Academic year and gives the scholars inspiration to carry on.

The large place of God's place where He wills every life shall come. No one is so ambitious for himself as God is for each one of us.

"The three word motto of the school, Virtus, Vigor, Veritas," said Mr. Dibblee, "is a Trinity group of high objectives. That the call to service was responded to so promptly and with such a large number of boys had realized the truths of this motto. The influence and spirit of lecture hall and athletic field could only be true in that largest place of supremest test, (and some of them, we bow our heads, to die for it.)"

The eloquent language of the large honor roll of valiant and heroic comrades speaks to you boys of today. You will see that it is not blotted nor forgotten. It used to be the past 'Lives of great men all remind us, which was taught and talked about. Today it is the future which calls to us. Not for us the reverend but what in God's providence shall come."

NATIONS MUST REPENT BEFORE VICTORY COMES

Rev. Dr. Hutchinson States Belief That National Sins Keeping Allies From Speedy Victory.

Last night Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, of Main street Baptist church, stated in his sermon his belief that the reason why the Allies were not winning was because of national sins, and until those sins were repented of and thrown aside they would not win.

His subject was, "Why is the Winning of the War Delayed," and he based his remarks on the words found in Joshua 7, 13 and 15: "Neither will I be with you any more, except ye destroy the accursed thing from among you; there is an accursed thing in the midst of thee, O Israel; thou canst not stand before thine enemies until ye take away the accursed thing from among you."

The speaker said that for four years a great war had been raging and on the part of the British it was a righteous war, but they had not won, nor were they winning, and he believed it was for the same reason that Israel failed to conquer the men of Ai, because of sin. It might be that the terrible blows now being received by the British on the western front were to teach the nation the need of getting back to God and he believed that if this was done victory would come and that speedily.

Among the national sins to be repented of, the speaker referred to the drink traffic, which had not yet been altogether put away; the desecration of the Sabbath. This had in many respects been made a mere holiday, and many of the professed followers of Jesus used the day for a holiday instead of the purpose for which it was intended, to worship and glorify God.

The Huns of ancient times had been called the scourge of God. It might be that the modern Hun was a scourge of God, used to bring his people back from the path of sin to walk in the paths of righteousness.

It had been said by some that the United States coming in would win the war, but while he was glad they had come in, he did not believe the war would be won until the nations had humbled themselves and confessed and repented of their sins.
