The First March West

When the North-West Mounted Police was established in 1873 by the federal government to police the vast areas of western Canada, reports indicated that control was needed as free traders were exchanging alcohol for valuable furs, robes and horses. Gathering at Fort Dufferin, Manitoba, in the summer of 1874, a force of 275 men set out on the long march to the Rocky Mountain foothills, in search of the whisky forts and traders.

In October of that year, Fort Macleod was built and by 1875, additional posts at Fort Saskatchewan, Fort Calgary and Fort Walsh were established. In 1882, the Force's headquarters was transferred from Fort Walsh to Regina, where it remained for 38 years.

Through patient negotiation, the NWMP established friendly relations with the Indians, wiped out the illicit whisky traffic and suppressed the lawlessness that had flourished in the region. The NWMP maintained order along the line of construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway and shouldered countless new duties brought about by the vast influx of settlers who flocked to the plains via the new railroad.
