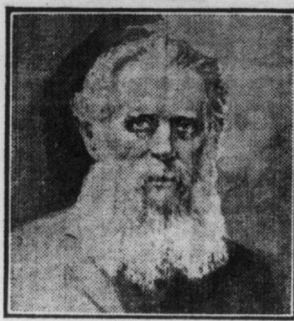

The increased automobile tax is to take effect on Feb. 1st. Under the new order of things, the tax of the motorist who owns a car of 25 horsepower or less is increased from \$1 to \$2; cars between 25 and 35 horsepower are taxed \$10; those between 35 and 50 horsepower, \$20; and those over 50 horsepower, \$25.
