VICE-PRESIDENT ATHOL GOW
MAY BE NOMINATED

When the annual meeting of the Toronto Amateur Baseball Association takes place next Monday night, Ed. G. Seyler, who occupies the president's chair, will definitely decide whether to stand for office, but he will not lose entirely to the T.A.B.A. as in his capacity as past president he will have power to vote on all questions. Mr. Seyler has carried the burden of president of the T.A.B.A. for two years, and has earned the respect of all amateur baseball enthusiasts during his term of office. Just who will succeed him is not certain, but it will likely be Mr. Verrall, who is now vice-president. The latter is president of the Toronto Senior League and has always been interested in baseball at Stanley Park. It is understood that Athol Gow has been nominated for the vice-presidency and if Mr. Verrall steps up to the presidency Mr. Gow will occupy the second office. The matter has been connected with the T.A.B.A. since it was organized in 1913. He has intimated that he will not stand for nomination on the Council, but he may do so for the vice-presidency.

THREE BIG POWER FOR A
TWO AGAINST.

PARIS, April 12, (By Lowell Mel)—A roll call of the whole peace force may be necessary to deter whether the former kaiser is to be hanged or otherwise corporally punished for his crimes.

The Committee on Responsibility War was divided on the question of personal punishment for William Great Britain, France and Italy favor it and the United States and Japan opposed it.

The ultimate decision, it was today, may have to be rendered by the plenary session discusses the committee's report providing for the punishment before an international or national courts, of all persons guilty of military crimes "regardless of rank."
