—Lower steel prices are effective to-day as result of an agreement between the Industrial board and fifteen "steel kings," after a two days' conference.

New prices announced thus far show reductions of from 14 to 18 per cent. from the war figures.

The agreement was the result of the first effort of the Industrial Board to bring down and stabilise war prices. The prices announced are: Basic pigiron reduced to \$25.75 per gross ton, a reduction of \$4.25; four-inch billets to \$38.50 a gross ton, and two-inch billets to \$42 a gross ton. Merchant bars to \$2.35 a hundred pounds. Plates to \$2.65 a hundred pounds. Structural steel \$2.45 a hundred pounds. The reduction o billets amounts to \$5 a gross ton, while that on bars, plates and structural steel is \$7 a net ton.
