In session 1877 moved for an inquiry into the case of Prof. O'Donoghue, charged with having aided in the North-West Rebellion. In session of 1882, moved and carried, an address to Her Majesty passed on the "Costigan Irish Resolutions" praying that she would grant Home Rule Government to Irel., for the release of the "suspects" and other ameliorations.
