Engineers hosed in battle

(Vancouver) The student paper at the University of British Columbia reported that two engineering students from the University of Calgary caused \$900 damage to UBC's student union building in a water fight

School environment contributes to suicide

(Winnipeg) University environments contribute to suicide among students according to a psychology professor at the University of Manitoba

"There are a number of things that would lead a person to feel . . . like you don't matter," said Dr. James Nickels.

He said many students are isolated from home and friends when they come to school, adding: "Students are known by a number, and not a name. With multiple choice and true/false tests you don't even get to write down what you know, you just make an 'X' on the page. If they eat poorly, interact poorly, and go home to a room by themselves, they may be at a risk."

At York, the counselling and development centre helps students deal with these sorts of situations. Metro Toronto also lists several suicide prevention phone lines in the Bell Telephone directory.

Student group rejected again

(Toronto) Membership in the Ontario Federation of Students (OFS) was rejected in a referendum two weeks ago at the University of Toronto.

OFS was defeated by 62 per cent (2,403 votes), after one year of trial membership. Poll-by-poll results indicate OFS had weak support in all but four areas of campus, although OFS representatives claimed stronger support on U of T's St. George campus.

OFS lost referendums at U of T in 1980, 1983, and now in 1989

Child care growth costs \$2-million

(Calgary) The University of Calgary will have 160 more spaces for its daycare programme — bringing the total to 386 — by adding a new \$2,225,000 facility. There is currently a 521-child waiting list, and a U of C senate task recently

identified 826 children whose parents wish to use the U of C daycare services. In addition to corporate and public sponsorship, the U of C daycare expects funding from the Alberta government. Don Getty pledged "a record level of

expenditures" in campaign promises education and training of (Alberta's) young people.'

Alberta held its provincial elections Monday.

No funds for Women's Centre

(Toronto) Students voted against funding the University of Toronto's Women's Centre, but not by a majority. Students had three options: 1,131 voted for special event funding only, 1,030 for full funding by the Students Administrative Council, and 1,645 voted against funding.

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
