on a kindred subject. My view of Chlonel Amery's abilities and attitude differs from yours. He is exceedingly industrious, always thinks in terms of the E,pire, and while he doesn't know Canada as a Canadian, or perhaps as well as he thinks he does, at least knows us better than any other British stateman except the Dake of Dewonshire.

I have extracted the portion of your letter referring to the subject discussed above, and have sent it to Mrs. Reford, Enlawe just now been informed that an organization along the lines you have in mind has taken form in Canada principally composed of young business men. I know little about it as yet as it has preserved much secreey, but I am going to try to find out.

It is very comforting to your friends
here to know that the park and city regulations down in
Hillywood are so strict. Too Blacklock feels much less
concerned about your moral welfare than he has all along.
