The Largest Individual Bridge Contract placed in Great Britain since that for the Forth Bridge has recently been secured by British firms in competition with those of Belgium, Germany and the United States. This contract comprises all the steel work for the railway and highway bridge to carry the Eastern Bengal State Ry. across the Lower Ganges, between Damukdea and Tera Ghat, India. The bridge, exclusive of approaches, comprises 15 main spans, each 359 ft. long and 52 ft. deep. These spans weigh about 1,300 tons each. The bridge will carry two broad gauge railway tracks and a footwalk supported on cantilevers from the main girders. The pier foundations for the main spans are carried to a depth of 150 ft. below the bed of the Ganges to guard against the deep scour of the river. The entire project involves an expenditure of about \$6,000,000.
