Administration, the general welfare of this Province, and to advance and maintain that harmony which ever ought to exist between the different branches of the Legislature.

Amessage from his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by Mr. Gautier, the Deputy-Secretary :

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency commands this Houfe to attend his Excellency immediately in the Council Chamber.

Acordingly, Mr. Speaker, and the House went up in the Council Chamber to attend his Excellency.

And being returned :

Mr. Speaker reported that the Houfe had attended his Excellency in the Council Chamber, where his Excellency was pleafed to make a Speech, of which Mr. Speaker faid he had, to prevent miftakes, obtained a copy, which he read to the Houfe, and is as follows :

CENTLEMEN OF HIS MAJESTY'S COUNCIL, AND OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY :

I HAVE deferred calling you together until this feason, in order to meet the general convenience of the Members, and from a confideration, that the Laws paff lat your laft Seflions contemplated a recess until this time.

HAVING nothing, fpecial, in command from His Majesty to lay before the Legislature, I have only to recommend your attention to the revival of such Laws as may be near expiring, and for making a suitable provision for the support of His Majesty's Government, and such public services as may be deemed necessary.

In all your difcuffions you will naturally recollect that the Legiflature being deliberative Bodies, independant of each other, it is of the utmost importance to avoid every thing which may occasion irritation between them, and to exercise, towards each other, fuch moderation as may tend to conciliate harmony, and manifest a determination to unite together in promoting the public welfare, without which the business of the country must be retarded, and the end and object wished for often wholly defeated. On my part you may rely on a readiness to concur in every measure which shall appear to be conducive to the interest and honour of His Majesty's Government and People.

I SHALL direct the proper Officers to lay the public Accounts before you; and whatever fpecial bufinefs may occur in the courfe of the Sellion for your confideration, fhall be communicated by particular meffage.

I HAVE great fatisfaction in congratulating you on the reports received from every part of the Province, of its general profperity: For the bleffings of health, and of a plentiful harvest, for the increase of the fisheries, and the manifest improvement of our agricultural concerns, we have abundant reason to be thankful to the Author of all good.

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Morris, Mr. Robie and Mr. Campbell, be a Committee to prepare an Addrefs in anfwer to his Excellency's Speech.

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Crane, Mr. Chipman, Mr. Lyon, Mr. Mortimer and Mr. Wollenhaupt, be a Committee of this Houfe, for the purpole of examining the Public Accounts jointly with a Committee of His Majefty's Council; and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Monk, Mr. Pyke and Mr. Cochran, be a Committee to report what Laws are near expiring, and for preparing and bringing in a Bill for continuing the fame.

Refelved, That no petition, of a private nature, be received after Thursday the twelfth day of December next.

Then the House adjourned until Monday, at Ten of the Clock.
