British News
Fox Gets Revenge.
The Kidare Hunt, during a run at Colbinstown, lost two of their hounds as a result of the Balinglass train running into the pack which was in pursuit of a fox which took to the railway track as a method of escape.
Raid on Dairies.
A few nights ago a number of farmers' dairies in the New Ross district were broken into and butter taken away in the night. In one case a tramp was seen by a farmer running away after the dairy had been broken open.
Clergyman's Shooting Accident
The Rev. R. H. Robinson, Rrumsnatt, Monaghan, sustained serious injury while at a shooting party at Bishalough, a grain of shot entering his eye. The Rev. gentleman was removed to Belfast, where an operation was performed, and the eye removed.
Man Riddled with Shot.
A shooting outrage, apparently premeditated, was reported to the Athlery police on Tuesday. Whilst driving cattle from a place called Moyvilla two brothers named Lane were fired at from a high hedge. Michael Lane was riddled with shot in the arms and legs, and fell on the roadside. The other brother went for police assistance, and when it arrived they found the injured man in a shocking condition. They conveyed him to the Galway infirmary.
Hounds Poisoned.
While the Clare Hounds were hunting in the Broadford district one of the dogs suddenly took ill and died in a short time. On examination it was found to be a case of poisoning. Four local dogs also died.
Bankrupts and Telephones.
The Irish Court of Appeal held on Tuesday that the debts of bankrupts for telephone rentals, though they did not accrue until after the bankruptcy, were recoverable in full by the Crown.
Volley Fired at Postman.
A daring shooting outrage was committed near Fountain Cross, about two miles from Ennis, where a rural postman named John Crowley was fired at, but fortunately was not struck. Four gunshots were discharged at him from a distance of sixty or seventy yards, but as it was dark at the time he could not see his assailants. The shooting took place about a quarter of a mile from Fountain post office, the postmaster of which heard the volley. Crowley belongs to Yougal, and was promoted to this district in December last. WORKMAN IS KILLED.
Another Probably Fatally Hurt by Bursting Concrete Form.
NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Nov. 14.—Louis Gardella, 485 Second street, Niagara Falls, N.Y., was instantly killed, and Richard Mieser of this city, was probably fatally injured in an accident in the generating station of the Ontario Power Co. on the lower river bank yesterday. A wooden form into which concrete was being poured gave way and fell upon Gardella and Mieser. Several other workmen had narrow escapes.
Gardella and Mieser were buried by a mass of concrete and timbers. The Italian's neck was broken. Mieser sustained a fracture of the skull which necessitated a delicate operation at the General Hospital. But little hope is held out for his recovery.
Gardella, who was 23 years old, came here from Warren, Pa., two years ago. He was to have been married this winter.
NOBEL PRIZE FOR TAGORE.
British Indian Post First Person Not White To Be So Honored.
STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 14.—The Nobel prize for literature was awarded yesterday to the British Indian poet Rabindranath Tagore, the first time on record that this prize has been given to anybody but a white person.
The works of Tagore were scarcely known outside of British India until recently, when some of them were translated into English.
The Tagore family is Hindu and belongs to the province of Bengal. Many of his members have devoted themselves to literature and art, and some of them are in the Indian civil service. Two of the most prominent are Maharajah Sir Pradyot Kumar Tagore and Rajah Sir Sourindro Mohan Tagore, the latter of whom was given the degree of doctor of music by the University of Philadelphia in 1875.
Radium Too Scarce Yet.
CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Scarcity of radium has prevented a thorough test of what its curative properties may be in cancer, according to the report made to the clinical congress of surgeons in session here by the cancer campaign committee.
"Only time will tell what percentage of cases can be cured with radium," the report states. "In the meantime the public should be informed through every possible source that early surgical treatment offers the best chance for cure."
The surgeons who have reported the best results from radium still urge early operation whenever possible.
Half Already Secured.
NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The volunteer committee of one thousand engaged in a two weeks' campaign for \$4,000,000 for the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. yesterday announced contributions amounting to \$4,174,747, the total contributed for the first four days of the campaign is \$2,379,634. The largest single contributor yesterday was W. F. Dodge with \$15,000. There were several contributions of four and five thousand dollars each.
