Town Council A letter from the G. W. McFarlane Engineering Co. was read, stating that they had vacated the Town Hall premises, and had left the building in good condition, and asking to be relieved of any further expenses in regard to same.

A by-law providing for the next municipal elections was also passed. The nominations will be held on Friday, December 22, at 7.30 p.m., and elections on New Year's day.

On motion of Messrs. Robinson and Pitts, Chief Felker was appointed local inspector under the Ontario Temperance Act, and a by-law will be introduced confirming same.

Handmaster Kuhlman and Secretary Aver appeared on behalf of the citizens' band, requesting a grant toward the expenses of the band. It was decided to grant the band the sum of \$75, to be applied to repairs of instruments.

Auto Accident What might have been a very serious automobile accident happened Saturday evening, when Mr. and Mrs. Bee and son, of Paris, were returning in their car from Brantford. They had with them Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Wooler, also of Paris, and when near the toll gate, the car skidded and went into the ditch, dropping some five or six feet. All the occupants were thrown out, but escaped injury, with the exception of Mrs. Wooler, who was rendered unconscious. Fortunately Mr. Bonner passed at the time and rendered valuable assistance, bringing the party to town, where it was found that Mrs. Wooler's injuries were not serious.

LADY'S BLOUSE. By Anabel Worthington. You can begin with this waist in planning the number you will need for fall. It is one of the new designs and strongly speaks style with its serviceable cut.



The distinguishing feature is having the back and yoke in one piece, and it is of interest that the fronts may roll back as far as the gathers to give the revers, or the right may lap the left front, as illustrated. The fronts roll back the neck may be filled in with lace or other soft, flilly material, and if silk is used to develop the design one will have a lovely afternoon blouse. Novelty is provided in the collar, which is high at the back and cut away in front; wire is used to keep it as high as the collar line. The sleeve is made noticeable with fulness below the elbow. This fulness is gathered into a cuff that is button trimmed; buttons in a larger size decorate the front of the blouse.

Taffeta, satin, pongee, poplin, linen and like fabrics, of heavy rather than light texture, are to be considered for developing this design. The pattern, No. 7,928, is cut in sizes 36 to 42.
