

## RAISE FUNDS FOR BELGIAN RELIEF

Endeavor to Obtain From  
the City Sum of \$250  
Per Month

Plans for the raising of the sum of \$250.00 per month from the city of Brantford for the purpose of maintaining 100 Belgian families were discussed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of a committee appointed from the Board of Trade and other bodies of the city, with the result that a campaign was decided upon for the purpose of raising the required sum through a system of canvassing and through the medium of the press, pledges to be printed in the newspapers and signed by all willing to contribute to the cause.

The committee appointed comprised Messrs C. Cook, convenor, Rev. G. A. Woodside, Rev. C. Patterson-Smyth, C. L. Gamble, J. A. Powell, W. B. Preston, A. K. Bunnell, Geo. Hately, M. J. O'Donohue, A. J. McCann, R. Scarfe, Logan Waterous, Mr. C. Cook was appointed chairman of the committee and Geo. Hately secretary-treasurer, with an executive comprising Messrs Cook, O'Donohue and Waterous, to see to the issuing of circulars to the members of the Board of Trade and to other bodies. Messrs Waterous and Preston were appointed a committee to lay the matter in hand before the Sunday schools of the city, and also before the Ministerial Alliance.



### STEAMER SAFE

Savannah, Ga., Dec. 3.—After a hard fight with a terrific gale in which she lost her anchors and had her wheel smashed, the British steamer Amakura has arrived here from St. John, N.B. She left St. John December 22. Six hours out, according to her officers, she was struck by a gale and attempted to make St. Mary's Bay, but failed. The anchors held for a few hours but finally the chain snapped and the vessel drifted in the wind, until the seas calmed. The crew suffered extremely from the cold.

## LT.-COL. BRUCE IS REMOVED

His Appointment as Inspector General of Canadian Medical Services Cancelled

London, Jan. 3.—It is officially stated that Sir Geo. Perley has cancelled Col. Bruce's appointment as Inspector-General.

A paragraph in the report of the Baple Commission that will be read with especial satisfaction is the following:

"As to allegations of unfitness among officers selected for commissions in the Canadian Medical Service, the report is that the proportion of undesirable in the corps is at least as low as in any other branch of the service, there would have been no objection to his criticism."

"The board cannot agree that sufficient attention has not been paid to economy in the management and arrangement. On the contrary these have been found to be most advantageous to the Canadian Government."

Douglas Robertson, in a cable from London to The Evening Telegram, says:

Sir Geo. Perley has cancelled the appointment of Lieut.-Col. Herbert Bruce as Inspector-General of Canadian Medical Services, and instructed Lieut.-Col. Murray McLaren to take the post. This is one result of the finding of the Baple commission on Bruce's report of the Canadian Medical Services.

### RUBBER GOES HIGHER



New York, Jan. 3.—An immediate fourteen per cent advance in the price of rubber footwear of all kinds was announced here yesterday by the United States Rubber Company. This represented, it was said, by an officer of the company, an increase of almost twenty per cent over the price of this time last year, due to conditions brought about by the war. The company has also advanced the price of its tires, at once, averaging 15 per cent for casings and 10 per cent for tubes.


