

A BOOST THAT TURNED OUT TO BE A KNOCK.

STILL LISTENING TO PROSECUTING EVIDENCE

Number of Witnesses Examined Today in the La Belle Case—Accused Man Was Well Known by Number of Dawson People—Crowd of Onlookers in Court Room as Large as Yesterday.

The third day of the trial of Edward La Belle began this morning with the court room less crowded than it has been at any time since the case began. Quite a number of witnesses were examined, some seemingly unimportant but all a part of the chain of evidence being wrapped around the accused which may result in his being found guilty and given the extreme penalty of the law. The first witness called was William McKay, formerly night clerk at the Donovan hotel. Fournier had frequently stopped at the hotel and the witness had known him since his first visit last June. The register was produced and witness testified as to the registration of Fournier, the signature, however, having been made by himself as Fournier could not write. The signature on June 25, 27, 30 and July was not his writing, all however, being written in the same hand. Witness knows who Fournier is and when asked where he was in the barracks, he remembers seeing Fournier right along while he was stopping at the hotel. Don't know La Belle and never saw him before. Constable Barrett, formerly stationed at Fort McLeod, N. W. T., testified as to having been sent to Butte, Montana, for a certain purpose which he accomplished. When there he visited the chief of police and afterward a pawn shop on the Main street where he secured a watch, ring, lapel button and charm which had been pledged by La Belle. All were brought to Dawson by the witness, he identifying the articles while on the stand. John Dowdall followed. He is a second hand dealer whose place of business is on Dugas street. Between what streets he could not tell, but he is sure it is in Dawson. He thinks he has seen the accused and when asked by the crown prosecutor when and where he replied "at the preliminary hearing." "Yes," replied Mr. Congdon, "we all saw him there." "He saw him for the first time he believed in his place of business about the 5th or 6th of July. Some goods were sold to the witness by the accused and the signature placed in the book containing the record of second hand articles purchased is that of the prisoner who claimed to be from Vancouver. The purchase consisted of a pair of gray woolen blankets which remained in the possession of the witness until they were taken away by the police and

used at the preliminary hearing, where he had again identified them. Fortunately Dube was next. He has been in Dawson for two years. Knows La Belle well. Came in together in the spring of 1900 from Skagway. La Belle had told him he was from St. Rose. During the two years La Belle was here he thought he had been working of the creek the greater part of the time. Witness has cabins for rent. Rented one to the accused on June 25 last located at the corner of Eighth avenue and Church street. At the time La Belle made the deal witness was at his cabin and the prisoner was alone. The latter took possession that evening and witness saw him there two days later, at which time Peter Fournier was with him. Has known Fournier well for the past 25 years when he lived in Montreal. First saw Fournier at the cabin La Belle had rented on June 27 about 10 o'clock in the morning. He presumed Fournier slept at the cabin as La Belle had told him so the day he rented the cabin. They occupied the cabin not more than seven days and then disappeared, but where to the witness did not know. Next saw the prisoner on Queen street on July 29 where he was playing cards in a saloon. Witness passed the time of day with him and asked where he had come from and he replied Eagle City. Two or three days later Fournier was seen and passed on the street. The cross-examination by Mr. Hagel was confined as to the witness' knowledge as to whether or not Fournier could write. The witness also gave La Belle a good character as far as he knew. On re-direct examination Dube said that at the time La Belle was in town he was employed at the Madden house by Tom Lamar as a booster. His lordship suggested that counsel define to the jury what a booster is and his duties, which caused everyone to smile. C. Scottie on being sworn testified that he lives on the road to the Ogilvie bridge the second cabin, this side of the bluff. He has known the prisoner and also Fournier for two years. PRETTY CEREMONY

Launching of an American Gunboat in Japan.

This gunboat is one of five ordered for service in the Philippines. It was christened by the daughter of Admiral Robley Evans. At the moment of the ceremony a paper cage at the bow was cut open and a number of white doves were liberated. The air was filled with paper blossoms scattered by the birds in their flight. As the boat slid into the water whistles were blown and the band played the Star-Spangled Banner. The ceremony was witnessed by 250 guests.

IN BAD SHAPE

Pennsylvania Mines Are Flooded With Water.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Vancouver, Oct. 28.—Wm. Johnston, a mine boss from Shamokin, Pa., has arrived here where he will work in the future. He says that his mine at Shamokin had 1300 feet of water in it and it will take two years to pump it out before work can be resumed. While other mines are not so bad most of them are in a state of demoralization and a long time will be required to get them in working condition. Not half of the men on strike have gone back to work and it is almost certain that there will be trouble again next spring.
